

2016 CONCERT SEASON

From the iconic music of John Philip Sousa and the majestic sound of a Mahler symphony to music from the great film scores and world premières, the 2016 concert season will have a little of everything. Several concerts will stream live on the Marine Band's website and YouTube channel, so look for the live stream icon throughout.

"The President's Own" will open its Showcase Series on Sunday, Jan. 10 with the 13th annual Sousa Season Opener featuring the Marine Band at George Mason University's Center for the Arts Concert Hall in Fairfax, Va. The concert will include almost exclusively works by "The March King," including a sneak peek of some of the marches on Volume Two of "The Complete Marches of John Philip Sousa" recording project. The 2016 season consists of weekly concerts by the Marine Band and Marine Chamber Orchestra, as well as chamber music performances, January through May. Highlights include: a concert about childhood dreams; a clarinet choir chamber music program; premières by Gerard Schwarz and Adam Schoenberg; a Young People's concert titled "Meet the Band;" a joint performance with the University of Maryland Orchestra in honor of the centennial of World War I; and a concert of film music at the Music Center at Strathmore in North Bethesda, Md. All events are free and no tickets are required unless noted. More information about each event can be found below. All travel expenses are the responsibility of the United States Marine Corps.

Sponsors typically are schools and universities, newspapers, radio and television stations, civic and educational organizations, chambers of commerce, and local governments.

Franz Josef Haydn's Symphony No. 96 and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's Symphony No. 41 were so legendary they each earned nicknames the composers could never have imagined. Haydn's *The Miracle* and Mozart's *Jupiter*, composed within a few years of one another, captured the ears, hearts, and minds of their audiences and took on lives of their own. These composers and their symphonies are just as relevant today as they were in the 1780s. The program also features Danish composer Carl Nielsen's Flute Concerto, a musical portrait dedicated to the flutist of the Copenhagen Wind Quintet.



The musical and personal lives of Romantic composers Robert and Clara Schumann and their contemporary Johannes Brahms were inextricably intertwined. At their very first meeting, Robert invited the relatively unknown twenty-year-old Brahms to his piano and was so taken that he ran to get his wife, Clara, to hear what he described as "genius." That night Clara took to her diary, writing, "Here is one who comes as if sent from God." Thereafter, Robert served as Brahms' mentor, dear friend, and unabashed supporter, even calling him "the next Beethoven." Following Robert Schumann's tragic suicide attempt and committal to an asylum several months later, Brahms vowed to stay with Clara until Robert's recovery. In the intervening two and a half years until Robert's death at age 46, Brahms realized he had found his "one great love" in Clara. The two never married, Brahms instead choosing to live by the motto "Frei Aber Einsam" [Lonely but Free]. Their unconsummated relationship continued for 40 years until Clara's death in 1896. Stricken with grief, Brahms was physically unable to attend her funeral procession. After her burial, Brahms took ill and followed Clara to the grave less than 11 months later. The three composers' mutual love and influence lives on in their music.

The Marine Band returns to the Music Center at Strathmore on March 14, with a special concert highlighting film music.

SNEAK PEAK AT APRIL AND MAY CONCERTS

Upcoming concert highlights in April and May include a Young People's Concert and a joint concert with the Marine Chamber Orchestra and University of Maryland Symphony Orchestra, as well as the annual Summer Blast Off! at Wolf Trap on Memorial Day weekend. The Young People's Concert, titled "Meet the Band," will allow children a front row seat to meet the instruments of the concert band, their families, and how their sounds move from silly to sonorous in a fun and engaging introduction to the concert band. Following the program, children are invited to a "petting zoo" to try the instruments for themselves!

The joint orchestra concert is titled "The Mintage of Man: Remembering World War I," and marks the centennial of the first World War. The program, curated by University of Maryland musicologist Patrick Warfield, is an examination of major concert works from the period, as well as rarely performed works by Edward Elgar and Frank Bridge.

The annual Summer Blast Off! at Wolf Trap is packed with popular and classical favorites including patriotic marches, new arrangements of Broadway showtunes, and, of course, Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture. As always, the musical extravaganza is capped off with one of the best fireworks displays in the area.
