NATIONAL SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA AND "THE PRESIDENT'S OWN" UNITED STATES MARINE BAND PERFORM SPECIAL, FREE CONCERT HONORING THE MILITARY

Part Of The NSO's "Notes Of Honor" Series Saluting Military Service

Friday, November 10, 2017, at 7 p.m.

(WASHINGTON)—The National Symphony Orchestra (NSO) and "The President's Own" United States Marine Band perform a special free concert in honor of the military for Veterans Day, on Friday, November 10, 2017 at 7 p.m. at the Kennedy Center Concert Hall. The concert features both the U.S. Marine Band, led by Colonel Jason K. Fettig, and the NSO, with its new Music Director Gianandrea Noseda. The program includes works with an American flair as well as familiar classical works by Bernstein, Beethoven, Prokofiev, Bizet, Rossini, and Sousa, as well as the Armed Forces Medley. November 10 also marks the 242nd anniversary of the U.S. Marine Corps' founding in 1775.

Part of the NSO's *Notes of Honor: NSO Salutes the Military* initiative, this performance is presented in collaboration with the USO of Metropolitan Washington, and is free and open to the public, particularly all active, veteran, prior service, and retired service members and their families; advance reservations are required. ABOUT GIANANDREA NOSEDA

Gianandrea Noseda, 53, is widely recognized as one of the leading conductors of his generation. He was named the National Symphony Orchestra's seventh music director in January 2016, with a four-year term beginning in the 2017–2018 season. Noseda joins a distinguished list of conductors who have led the NSO since its founding in 1931: Christoph Eschenbach, Leonard Slatkin, Mstislav Rostropovich, Antal Doráti, Howard Mitchell, and Hans Kindler.

Noseda is a frequent guest with the leading opera houses and orchestras in the world, including the Cleveland Orchestra, La Scala, Munich Philharmonic, New York Philharmonic, NHK Symphony, Orchestra dell'Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia, Philadelphia Orchestra, Royal Opera House, Wiener Symphoniker, and Zurich Opera. In 2015, he made his debut with the Berlin Philharmonic and at the Salzburg Festival where he led the Vienna Philharmonic in performances of *Il trovatore*.

Noseda is dedicated to the next generation of artists with his masterclasses and work with and touring of youth orchestras, including the European Union Youth Orchestra.

A native of Milan, Noseda is Cavaliere Ufficiale al Merito della Repubblica Italiana, marking his contribution to the artistic life of Italy. In 2015, he was honored as *Musical America*'s Conductor of the Year, and was named the 2016 International Opera Awards Conductor of the Year. In December 2016 he was privileged to conduct the Nobel Prize Concert in Stockholm.

ABOUT THE NSO

The 2017–2018 season marks the National Symphony Orchestra's 87th season, and Gianandrea Noseda's first as its music director. The Italian conductor serves as the Orchestra's seventh music director, joining the NSO's legacy of such distinguished leaders as Christoph Eschenbach, Leonard Slatkin, Mstislav Rostropovich, Antal Dorati, Howard Mitchell, and Hans Kindler. Its artistic leadership also includes Principal Pops Conductor Steven Reineke and Artistic Advisor Ben Folds.

Founded in 1931, the Orchestra has always been committed to artistic excellence and music education. In 1986, the National Symphony became an artistic affiliate of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, where it has performed a full season of subscription concerts since the Center opened in 1971. The 96-member NSO regularly participates in events of national and international importance, including official holiday celebrations through its regularly televised appearances for Capitol Concerts, and local radio broadcasts on Classical WETA 90.9FM, making the NSO one of the most-heard orchestras in the country.

The Orchestra performs approximately 150 concerts each year, including classical and popular concerts at the Kennedy Center, at Wolf Trap in the summer, and on the lawn of the U.S. Capitol; chamber music performances in the Terrace Theater, on the Millennium Stage, and at theaters around D.C. It has a distinguished history of touring, and an extensive education program, with a range of offerings for families and children ages three and up.

Additionally, the NSO's community engagement projects are nationally recognized, including NSO In Your Neighborhood, which comprises a week of approximately 50 performances in schools, churches, community centers, and other neighborhood venues, and Sound Health, a collaboration with the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and its affiliated organizations. Career

development opportunities for young musicians include the NSO Youth Fellowship Program and its acclaimed Summer Music Institute. For more information, visit nationalsymphony.org.
