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Lieutenant Commander John Philip Sousa, who is now playing his twenty-first season with his band in Willow Grove Park, is so enthusiastic over the organization and the program that he could not refrain from making the following statement:

"If one remains long enough in active service, a record of achievement may be interesting. Thirty years ago I left the Marine Band, which I had conducted for twelve years, and went to New York to organize the band which in all these years has borne my name. As managers during this period I had David Blakeley, Everet H. Reynolds, George Frederick Hinton, Frank Christianer, James S. Barnes, Edwin Clarke, and, since 1916, Harry Askin.

"A record of the organization in membership has contained many names famous in band and orchestral history, a number of the brilliant players of the band of former years are now conductors of their own organizations. It is believed that the repertoire of the band has been remarkably eclectic in embracing the best compositions of all lands. I have always felt that the music of the old masters written for orchestra in which the division of instruments is sharply drawn and the strings of out-

standing importance do not lend themselves to the best effects for a wind combination any more so than purely string combination would be effective in higher flights of Wagner or Richard Strauss.

"In the thirty years of the existence of my band it has made many tours of the United States and Canada, five tours of Europe and one around the world. It has covered over 800,000 miles of travel. It has depended entirely for its support on the musical public, and it has shown its gratitude by giving, at all times, the best efforts to its audiences.

"The new compositions of mine to be played on this tour will be a march entitled, 'The Gallant Seventh,' dedicated to the officers and men of the 7th Regiment, N. Y. N. G. (107th of the 27th Division). History records their brilliant achievements overseas. A new suite, 'Leaves From My Notebook,' containing musical references to a 'Genial Hostess,' 'The Camp Fire Girls' and 'The Lively Flapper,' a collocation, 'A Bouquet of Beloved Inspirations,' entwines themes by Bizet, Meyer-Helmund, Weber, Mendelssohn and Rossini. These, together with a number of novelties, will form the programs for this season's engagement of my band in Willow Grove Park."

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THE MUSIC OF THE MOSLEM MAID

Oriental music, as far as I see and understand it, is a different thing entirely from the imitations of it which are given and accepted as "the real thing" over here. In the first place, the mentality of Orientals is entirely different from that of Europeans.

I had a good many Egyptian lady piano pupils of high family, and always gave my lessons without supervision of any kind. No other man of any nationality, I believe, has ever been allowed such privileges. These ladies generally practiced well, and were much less stodgy and quicker to understand what was required of them than a great many European ladies. Some of them played Bach, Beethoven, and Chopin quite well, the latter composer being the general favorite. Of course, they never studied any Arabic music with me; but some of them took lessons on the "ood," the favorite national instrument—a kind of large mandolin or guitar and played with a plectrum—from native musicians. I had to give my lessons in French, which they all speak in addition to their native Arabic; very few of them understand English. Several of them confided to me their disgust with the present narrow existence of women in Oriental countries. One, a fine specimen of a lady in every way—young, striking-looking, elegant, well read, speaking four or five languages fluently (she had two splendid grand pianos and a fine Blüthner upright)—told me that she had a horror of marriage with an Egyptian, as it would mean the entire curtailment of even as much liberty as she then possessed. Only this year she broke off the engagement which had been arranged for her by her relatives, and I should question if she ever marries at all.—*Frederick Kitchener, in the Monthly Musical News.*

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SOUSA AFFECTED BY EARLY IMPRESSIONS

'March King's' Ears Were Filled With Martial Music as Child

NEW YORK, July 14.—Those who love to believe that childhood impressions are most likely to determine the latter life of the individual have a powerful argument in the case of Lieutenant Commander John Philip Sousa, the famous bandmaster.

Sousa was born in Washington in 1854. From the time he was 7 years old until the time he was 11 years old the civil war raged, and Washington was an armed camp. There were many military bands, brass bands, as we know them, and "buckskin" bands, composed of fifers and drummers. Then, when Sousa was 11 he saw the greatest military event which had ever taken place on this continent, the grand review of the Union armies in Washington. Sousa was 11, and his father, Antonio Sousa was one of those who marched in the grand review.

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WILLOW GROVE PARK

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Lieutenant Commander John Philip Sousa, who is now playing his twenty-first season with his band in Willow Grove Park, is so enthusiastic over the organization and the program that he could not refrain from making the following statement:

"If one remains long enough in active service, a record of achievement may be interesting. Thirty years ago I left the Marine Band, which I had conducted for twelve years, and went to New York to organize the band which in all these years has borne my name. As managers during this period I had David Blakeley, Everet H. Reynolds, George Frederick Hinton, Frank Christianer, James S. Barnes, Edwin Clarke, and, since 1916, Harry Askin.

"A record of the organization in membership has contained many names famous in band and orchestral history, a number of the brilliant players of the band of former years are now conductors of their own organizations. It is believed that the repertoire of the band has been remarkably eclectic in embracing the best compositions of all lands. I have always felt that the music of the old masters written for orchestra in which the division of instruments is sharply drawn and the strings of out-

standing importance do not lend themselves to the best effects for a wind combination any more so than purely string combination would be effective in higher flights of Wagner or Richard Strauss.

"In the thirty years of the existence of my band it has made many tours of the United States and Canada, five tours of Europe and one around the world. It has covered over 800,000 miles of travel. It has depended entirely for its support on the musical public, and it has shown its gratitude by giving, at all times, the best efforts to its audiences.

"The new compositions of mine to be played on this tour will be a march entitled, 'The Gallant Seventh,' dedicated to the officers and men of the 7th Regiment, N. Y. N. G. (107th of the 27th Division). History records their brilliant achievements overseas. A new suite, 'Leaves From My Notebook,' containing musical references to a 'Genial Hostess,' 'The Camp Fire Girls' and 'The Lively Flapper,' a collocation, 'A Bouquet of Beloved Inspirations,' entwines themes by Bizet, Meyer-Helmund, Weber, Mendelssohn and Rossini. These, together with a number of novelties, will form the programs for this season's engagement of my band in Willow Grove Park."



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

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Music An Ideal Christmas Present

Prepared by

Lt. Com. John Philip Sousa, U. S. N. R. F., tells in *The Etude* why he believes music to be one of the finest of all Christmas presents.

"It is for this reason that many parents and friends who desire to make a Christmas present turn to music lessons, musical instruments, talking machine records, books, tickets for concerts or opera, sheet music, and so forth. Unlike many presents that lose their value in a few weeks, music often lasts a lifetime. Very little in the way of musical education is wasted. Even though the student has not the slightest thought of music as a profession, unless he is hopelessly stupid, he will acquire a mental training and an artistic taste that will stay with him all the rest of his days and add unlimited happiness to his life. How can one possibly make a more delightful present than one of this sort?"

"'But,' persists the very material father, 'I don't want to bother with music as a present for my boy. I want something practical.' He probably does not realize that the very cigar which he is puffing was made in a factory in Cuba in which the workers insist upon being supplied with music while they work. For years there have been trained singers employed in some industries to perform during the working hours. Practical fathers should know that there is nothing like music for speeding up the worker. The singing worker is happy and always has been. In the Fiji Islands I remember the natives who were employed to load coal. Singing was as much a part of their working equipment as their brawny muscles. Without song it would unquestionably have taken a much longer time to load the ship. What does practical father think of that?"

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From the days of the Marine Band onward, John Philip Sousa has been a firm believer in soloists as a feature of all band concerts.

"Where is the young player to get his chance?" asks Sousa, in replying to the oft-asked question. "For a number of years in my youth I sat in the ranks in the orchestra in Philadelphia. I didn't get much pay; I gave lessons on the violin in my spare time to eke out my income; I desired to get married; I needed money to buy other instruments, so that I might master them all. But my mood was such that all other considerations were swept aside when I got a chance, now and again, to play a small solo or a bit of obligato. Those opportunities gave to me the direct appeal to the public, and the response of an audience to my efforts gave to me the confidence which every musician must have if he or she is to be a successful soloist."

Some of the most famous musicians in the United States took their schooling with Sousa and his band. There was the late Maude Powell, the violinist, who died in 1919, lamented by what was perhaps the largest permanent clientele ever possessed by a violinist in this country. When, new from

her years of study in Germany, she came home to this country, she was engaged by Sousa as a soloist with his band, and after three tours under Sousa set forth on her brilliant career as a recital-giver. She never forgot to explain that she owed all the attributes that made her a successful recitalist to the season she spent with Sousa on tour—"and I," she would add, "the only woman in an entourage of 70 or more!"

Estelle Liebling, the soprano and a well-known and well-liked figure in recitals and concerts, also was a "Sousa-girl," making her first concert appearances under the "March King," and touring with him and his band.

"I never stand in the way of a player's leaving me," said Sousa. "Indeed, every offer made to one of my men is a high compliment to me and to my organization. If this flutist or that trombonist or such-and-such and oboe-player or trapsman get an offer, I say, 'Take it, my boy, and God bless you!' When he comes back, as he often does, there is always a job for him; if he doesn't come back I know that he has found satisfaction in being resident with an orchestra rather than itinerant with me, and I know that he, in turn, has given satisfaction to his new employers."

Lt. Com. John Philip Sousa, U. S. N. R. F., tells in *The Etude* why he believes music to be one of the finest of all Christmas presents.

"It is for this reason that many parents and friends who desire to make a Christmas present turn to music lessons, musical instruments, talking machine records, books, tickets for concerts or opera, sheet music, and so forth. Unlike many presents that lose their value in a few weeks, music often lasts a lifetime. Very little in the way of musical education is wasted. Even though the student has not the slightest thought of music as a profession, unless he is hopelessly stupid, he will acquire a mental training and an artistic taste that will stay with him all the rest of his days and add unlimited happiness to his life. How can one possibly make a more delightful present than one of this sort?"

"'But,' persists the very material father, 'I don't want to bother with music as a present for my boy. I want something practical.' He probably does not realize that the very cigar which he is puffing was made in a factory in Cuba in which the workers insist upon being supplied with music while they work. For years there have been trained singers employed in some industries to perform during the working hours. Practical fathers should know that there is nothing like music for speeding up the worker. The singing worker is happy and always has been. In the Fiji Islands I remember the natives who were employed to load coal. Singing was as much a part of their working equipment as their brawny muscles. Without song it would unquestionably have taken a much longer time to load the ship. What does practical father think of that?"

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How Music Study Should Be Considered

By IGNACE JAN PADEREWSKI

Music in itself is *one of the greatest forces for developing breadth in the home.* Far too many students study music with the view to becoming great virtuosi. Music should be studied for itself without any great aim in view except in the cases of marvelously talented children. Again many children might be developed into teachers or composers who would never make virtuosi. This should be very carefully considered. Most of the students assume that the career of the virtuosi is easier, more illustrious, and last, but not least, more lucrative than that of the composer. But is it not better to start out to be a great composer or a great teacher and become one, rather than to strive to be a virtuoso and prove a fiasco? The intellectual drill which the study of music gives the child is of great educational value. There is nothing which will take its place, and it is for this reason that many of the greatest educators have advocated it so highly. In addition to this, the actual study of music results in almost limitless gratification in later life in the understanding of great musical masterpieces.

Washington—Sousa's Home

ROMANCE and Lieut. Com. John Philip Sousa always have been boon companions, and there is considerable that is romantic and sentimental in the fact that the "march king" is returning to Washington in triumph with his concert at the President's Theatre, to avenge himself of a defeat suffered half a century ago. For the President's Theatre is on historic ground, not only for Sousa, but for the Nation, and it was in the building preceding the present one, the old Comique, that Sousa made his first appearance as a conductor and met not triumph but defeat.

The year is 1873. Sousa is 17 years old, and the old Comique is the site of a still earlier building in which had been held the inaugural balls for Presidents Van Buren, Polk, Taylor, Pierce and Buchanan. Sousa is engaged to play the violin and conduct the orchestra. On the day of his first appearance, a rainstorm comes. The theatre is flooded. But it is cleaned out after a fashion, and the performance is ordered. Sousa takes his place at the conductor's stand, the performance starts and his troubles begin. Soon the strings on the old square piano are snapping from the dampness. Two strings on Sousa's violin are next to go. He takes up the violin of one of his men. Soon that is out of commission and even the drummer is forced to retreat in disorder. The performance limps to a close, and the manager ends Sousa's engagement. One can imagine the youthful Sousa outside in the darkness shaking his fist at the building which has been the scene of his chagrin and vowing that some day he will return to that spot in triumph. That the theatre manager relents and blames the elements rather than Sousa, as well as offering to re-engage him, does not matter. Sousa has agreed to go on tour with Milton and Dolly Nobles, and the dust of his native Washington is shaken from his feet. But now Sousa has returned. Lacking but a few days of his sixty-eighth birthday, on November 3, 1922, Sousa returns, probably the most famous of all American musicians. One cannot help thinking Sousa's buoyant soul is singing in triumph. He has avenged himself in his native city.

There is little that is significant in the life of Sousa which is not permanently entwined with Washington. He was born, November 6, 1854, near the old Christ Church, on G Street, S. E. His father was of Portuguese descent, his mother of German parentage. His early musical training was received in Washington. His musical career began in Washington in 1871, his career as a conductor in 1873. In 1880 he returned to Washington to assume the directorship of the United States Marine Band—the President's own. In 1893 he fared forth from Washington at the head of his own band, and in 1922 he returns, virtually at the end of his thirty-first annual tour, a tour which has been the most successful of his long career. But Washington still is "home." Throughout the years he has cherished the ties which have bound him to the city. He is still a member of Hiram Lodge, A. F. & A. M., of Eureka Chapter, Royal Arch Masons, of Columbia Commandery, Knights Templar, of Altus Temple of

the Mystic Shrine, and of the Army and Navy and Grifflon Clubs.

The range of Sousa's musical accomplishments has been obscured in the popular mind because of his facility with the march, yet his fame as a composer might have rested securely without the aid of the form of composition of which he is the world's greatest exponent. Sousa wrote the first American operetta to be given a first-rate production in America. That operetta, "Desire," was produced in Philadelphia in 1884 and it was the production in which a young man with a pleasing basso-cantante voice and a sense of humor, named DeWolf Hopper, made his comic opera debut. "Desire" was followed by such typically American conceptions of operetta as "The Charioteer," "The Bride-Elect" and "El Capitan" as well as innumerable suites and studies. Now, at 68, what may be his greatest work is still before him, for during the next few months he is to set himself to the task of composing an opera, upon an American subject, embodying the elements of love, adventure and romance for Mary Garden.

But Sousa's great contribution to American music is the march. His operetta and suite music reveals an artistry as great as that of any of his contemporaries. In the realm of the march, Sousa stands alone and supreme. Many composers may write opera, comic opera, musical comedies, suites and popular numbers. Sousa is the only man in the world to whom has come the gift of writing measures to which have marched millions of armed men, wearing the uniforms of virtually every nation in the world. For his beloved Marines he wrote "Semper Paratus" which has become the official march of the Marines, and he has written a march even greater, "Stars and Stripes Forever," composed in a spirit of thanksgiving on Christmas Day as he neared the American shore after a long sojourn abroad, a march which sings and shouts its Americanism, but which nevertheless has become not only in America but throughout the world the greatest of military marches. Figures are so hard to come by that it is difficult to say that "Stars and Stripes Forever," which has become so much a part of the American ideal that audiences throughout the land stand when Sousa plays it, has sold to the extent of 10 millions of copies in America, while the English and American sales have surpassed those of America in volume, and that before the war, it was the most popular march in Germany. And yet Sousa intended it to be an expression of the irresistible spirit of victory and progress of America!

So Sousa comes back to Washington. Here he was born, and here were passed the days of his boyhood described in his novel, "Pipetown Sandy." Here were his early defeats and his first sweet triumphs, and no man ever has achieved so much that the joys of his first victories are dimmed. In Washington are his old friends and his best friends. To Washington comes the "march king," home for the happiest day of his busy year.

The girls unstrap their blankets, spread them on the ground, and throw themselves in graceful abandon. The twilight shadows deepen into night. A clear voice of one maiden is heard accompanied by ukeleles. The strain is caught up by all the girls, and at the close the sweet voice intones softly the closing cadence of the song, and the camp is lulled to slumber.
