The shooters were furnished with cards of identification, with their pictures on the inside cover and the class marked plainly on the other side, with their description. The

East Alton, Ill., March 6, 1912.—"Sports Life."—Though strange as it may at first appear, there can be no doubt about the high standard of quality of present-day guns, ammunition, targets and traps having a reactionary effect on the sport of trap shooting. Time was when, perhaps, the ownership of a certain gun, or the use of a "special" load gave one an advantage in competition, but in these days of "standardization" such is not the case, as the manufacturer now uses a popular-priced gun and standard factory-loaded ammunition is better equipped to do good work than he who used a "special" equipment in times past. Thus it will be seen that trap shooters now enter competitions on a more equitable basis than was once the case, and as a result, skill has practically been standardized. As evidence of this one need only refer to the journal reports of our previous tournaments and note the close scores exhibited.

He Misses Only 5 Targets Out of 150 While Horace Kirkwood, of Boston, Makes High Score Among Professionals---Sousa in Four-Cornered Tie

The first of the two-day target tournament held under the auspices of the Keystone Shooting League, was shot yesterday at Holmesburg Junction with a field of forty-six amateur and professional shots competing. With a clear day, little wind and perfect working of the traps everything essential for high score-making, was presented to the gunners and many took advantage of this opportunity to total well above the 140 mark. Some of the best amateurs from this city and State, Delaware, New Jersey and New York, fired at the shimmering blue rocks, while the expert element was represented by some of the best in that class.

It fell to the lot of an earnest advocate of trap shooting and a man who is doing his best to select a representative team to represent America in the coming Olympic world's shooting competition, Ralph L. Spotts, of the Larchmont Yacht Club, New York, to shoot the high gun. Out of his 150 targets Spotts smashed 145, running straight in seven of his ten 15-target events. In his last four he ran 30 breaks without a miss. This total was by far the best among the amateur contingent, for his nearest competitors, A. B. Richardson, of Dover, Del., and Fred Plumb, of Atlantic City, tied for second honors, with 142. Billy Severn, of the S. S. Whites and president of the Philadelphia Trap Shooters' League, landed third with 140, he beating Newcomb, Kahler, Landis and James by one bird.

Horace Kirkwood, of Boston, Mass., led the professional field with 144 smashes, defeating H. H. Stevens by a target. Neaf Apgar was the next highest expert with 142.

John Philip Sousa, the noted bandmaster, was an earnest and interested competitor. Sousa fell down somewhat in the 150-bird program, by only breaking 113 out of his 150 targets, but he came back so strongly in the 50-target event, which is a test for the Keystone Shooting League handicap trophy and which is to run for the two days, that he succeeded in tying with the high gun with 40 breaks. This event is a handicap rise one with the gunners placed at various yards, according to their known ability. The other men to reach the 40 mark were Charley Newcomb and Billy Wolstenroft, of this city, and H. Wells, the New York professional, H. B. Cook and H. Powers, of Atlantic City, and Dick Lamb, of Mount Holly tied for second place with 35 breaks.

The shoot ends today. The same program as shot yesterday will be presented to the gunners and the man who suc-

ceeds in totaling high score in the K. S. L. H. event will secure possession of the trophy. The scores follow:

The regular monthly shoot of the Independent Gun Club will be held at Holmeburg Junction on Saturday. The usual program will obtain, viz.: 100 targets per man, combined distance and dead bird, added handicap to govern. There will be a trophy for high gross score, and spoons for winners in Classes A, B and C, and also spoons for high net score. In addition to the regular trophy, this will be the first shoot for the Sousa Trophy, given the club by John Philip Sousa, who was elected an honorary member at the last yearly meeting. This trophy will be shot for under the following conditions: To be shot for at each monthly shoot; 100 targets per man; regular club handicap to govern; to become the property of the shooter first winning it three times; each winner's name to be engraved on same; scores of 100 or over to count as only 100. In case of tie at said monthly shoots each man to be given credit for a "win." In case of tie at said shoot, then shooter having three wins to shoot for 150 targets per man, from same place. The winner have that day the right to select one of added handicap to govern. In case of no way to select, then the trophy to be given to the shooter having the highest gross score.

SPOTTS HIGH GUN IN TWO-DAY SHOOT

New Yorker Smashed 174 Blue Rocks Out of 180 at Key- stone Tournament

RAIN STOPPED GUNNERS

HOLMESBURG JUNCTION, March 15. Ralf L. Spotts, representing the Larchmont Yacht Club and a member of the American team which will compete in the Olympic games at Stockholm, was high gun in the fifth annual tournament of the Keystone Shooting League, which commenced here yesterday and was halted by the downpour of rain this afternoon. Spotts really captured the honors in yesterday's events when he smashed 145 targets out of his total of 150, as to-day the shoot was declared off after only three events had been run down. The Larchmont gunner's average for the two days was 174 targets broken out of 180 fired at.

Alden B. Richardson, son of Congressman Richardson, high gun in to-day's shoot session, was next in line with 172 targets to his credit, while Fred Plum, of the Atlantic City Gun Club, finished third with 167 killed.

John Phillip Sousa, the bandmaster, captured the gold medal in the Keystone League's handicap event, which was concluded yesterday, the weather not permitting its continuation to-day.

The "March King" walked away with the event when he smashed 48 of his targets standing on the 16-yard line. This performance was really remarkable, inasmuch as his average in the target match was of the ragged order. Mr. Sousa was congratulated on all sides.

The target smashers competing in the fifth annual tournament of the Keystone Shooting League, here, to-day, were greeted by a steady downpour of rain which seemed to dampen the ardor of the entire field.

For a time it was thought best by the management to call off the shoot today, but the contestants voted in favor of a continuation. Up to noon, however, only three events of fifteen targets each had been shot off at that time. Alden B. Richardson, son of Congressman Richardson, of Dover, Delaware, had made by far the best score of the Simon pures by smashing every target but one, a total of 44 targets out of 45.

Richardson's nearest competitors were Charley Newcomb, the S. S. White Club expert, and Ralph Spotts, yesterday's champion, each of whom dropped two for a total of 48 targets out of their respective 45. Richardson smashed his first forty-three in succession, an excellent run considering the conditions. Newcomb pulled one target in both the first and second string, breaking the last fifteen straight, while Spotts missed one target in the first, and one in the third.

Near Apgar, the Pleasantville, N. J., professional, was the only sharpshooter. He broke every target in three events and had the honor of being the sole gunner present, either professional or amateur, to do so. Before the entire field had finished the third event the rain came down in such volume that the management called the men into the club house and decided to call a halt until later and decided to call a halt for the day.

For two hours the crowd were entertained by John Philip Sousa, who related several interesting stories of his recent circuit of the globe, visiting almost every country.

"Bilby" Wonderly, the four-year-old mascot of the Club, displayed some rare marksmanship with his little rifle, smashing objects set near him to the amusement of the gunners who sat around the fire drying out.

SOME REALISTIC DECORATIONS

Scenic Effect This Year Surpasses Anything of Its Kind Ever Attempted Before.

With handsome decorations and realistic Western scenery the annual Sportsmen's Show opened yesterday in Madison Square Garden. The quadruple broke 117 out of 125 birds. This is the best record to date for both 1911 and 1912.

RAIN A HANDICAP TO TARGET SHOOT

R. L. Spotts, Larchmont Yacht Club Gunner, Wins High Average Money.

William Severn, despite a run of 87 straight on Thursday, had an off day yesterday and only succeeded in getting a total of 163.

Horace Kirkwood by smashing 29 retained his hold on first place among the professionals with 173, just one target better than Neaf Aggar, who broke straight in both of yesterday's events.

John Phillip Sousa won the Keystone Shooting League Handicap after a tie with William H. Wolstencroft and Charles H. Newcomb, and the well-known bandmaster did not have to lift his gun to secure the prize. Mr. Wolstencroft was dissatisfied with the handicap allotted him, 17 yards, and refused to shoot, that he was disqualified. Philadelphia, Pa., March 16.—After an excellent start and good weather on the first day, the second day's shooting in the fifth annual registered

Keystone Shooting League tournament, on March 14 and 15, was cut short by a terrific rain storm that continued all day. Only a little over two events had been shot when the tournament was declared off. On the combined program Ralph L. Spotts, the Larchmont

Yacht Club shooter, succeeded in winning high average money by cracking a total of 174 targets out of the 180 he shot at. A. B. Richardson, of Dover, Del., finished a good second with 172, while Charles H. Newcomb, Harry Kahler and Fred Plum were tied for third honors with 167. William Severn, despite a run of 87 straight, only succeeded in getting a total of 163. Horace Kirkwood gained

first place among the professionals with 173, just one target better than Neaf Apgar. John Philip Sousa won the Keystone Shooting League handicap, after a tie with William H. Wolstencroft and Charles H. Newcomb. Wolstencroft was dissatisfied with the handicap allotted him, 17 yards, and refused





The fifth annual registered target tournament of the well-known Keystone Shooting League of Philadelphia, which was scheduled for Thursday and Friday, March 14 and 15, was a success, although the inclement weather the second day prevented the program being finished, the management declaring the shoot off after the squads had gone down the line once, owing to the heavy downpour of rain. Forty-six entries, including nine trade representatives, faced the traps on the opening day, and of the remaining thirty-seven "simon-pures" there were eighteen who came to Philadelphia for this shoot, the attendance of Philadelphia's amateurs being very disappointing. It seems strange that Philadelphia can muster close to two hundred amateurs at their monthly league shoots of the Philadelphia Trap Shooters' League, and yet, with the amateurs given the opportunity of competing with the Squier money-back system, assuring them their money back less the price of targets, they fail to even come out to look at the shoot. The writer asked several who were not shooting the reason, and they all had the same excuse, why should they enter and have to meet the crackerjacks of not only Philadelphia, but New York and others as well, who were in attendance, all at the same distance, 16 yards, and have no chance of winning anything in the end, yet they claimed by distance handicaps 16 to 21 yards rise, as in the Keystone handicap, they had some chance. And there were not only one or two, but at least ten who said the same thing. Then again, it was noticed that this year's event did not have the publicity it should have had in the Philadelphia papers, which might have something to do with the attendance. Anyway, the attendance was not up to expectations, but what it lacked in quantity it more than made up for in the quality of the shooting.

The opening day, March 14, ideal weather conditions favored the shooter and excellent scores were recorded, yet nothing phenomenal, as the Keystone grounds are hard grounds to shoot on and very deceptive to the stranger, at least until he gets started. In the morning of the first day, especially at No. 1 trap, the glare of the sun shining on the water of the Delaware seemed to hurt the eyes of the shooter, but in the afternoon, when the sun went behind the clouds, shooting was simply great, and it was then that high scores were made. The first day shooting started at 10 a. m., and at the end of the first 45 targets, or the first trip down the line, Ralph L. Al Geohegan is the peerless cashier who handles the cashier's end of the shoot. He is not a shooter but is the most expert man in the country in handling a large shooting tournament.


John Philip Sousa, the eminent bandmaster, will be at the coming tournament. He is a shooter of great ability and has lately won several matches in the east.

The Pennsylvania State Shoot held at Sunbury, May 22, 23 and 24, was one of the best tournaments yet held under the auspices of the Pennsylvania State Sportsmens' Association, over 100 shooters taking part. The honors of the tournament for the most part went Philadelphia way, largely through the excellent work of Harry W. Kahler. The Western Pennsylvania representation was woefully weak and to our mind this largely accounts for Kahler's easy victory, although his shooting was of such class that it is extremely doubtful if any of the Pittsburgh cracks could have beaten him.

Mr. Kahler was high over all at the tournament, with 434x450, beating the high professional by seven targets, and the next amateur by 15 targets. He won the state championship at singles; won the Wolstencroft trophy with a score of 43x50 doubles, and was a member of the Highland Gun Club's No. 1 team, which won the Reading and Harrisburg trophies, emblematic of the four and three-man team championships.

Allen Heil and Howard Schlicher of Allentown won the Lindsey trophy for two man teams by scores of 64x75, including 10 pairs of doubles as against 63x75 for Kahler and F. M. Eames of the Highland team.

The Reading trophy was the subject of a close contest, the Highland No. 1 and Sunbury-Selinsgrove No. 1 teams having to shoot off a tie, in which Highland won, 92 to 88. The Harrisburg trophy was won rather easily by the Highland team.

ONE-ARMED SHOOTER SMASHED TO BITS 149 OUT OF 150 TARGETS

**Wonderful Shooting by Geo.
W. Maxwell Feature of the
Opening Day**

**LESTER GERMAN DID
VERY FANCY WORK**

**In 25 Double Targets He Let
Only One Get by—Fine
Records Mark Opening of
Southern Handicap Tourna-
ment.**

The feature of the opening day of the seventh southern handicap tournament was the record made by Geo. W. Maxwell, a one armed shooter. Out of 150 single targets he missed only one lone clay pigeon, his score being 149. In the doubles, when the exertion of handling the heavy gun must have been rather taxing, his record being 43 out of 50.

Ideal weather marked the opening of the great tournament, for it was a cool, clear morning and developed into a perfect May day. Beginning at 9:45 o'clock, the shooting continued until about 4:30 in the afternoon. In the afternoon the sport was largely attended, there being many visitors on the grounds.

There were 80 entries yesterday, this being somewhat less than the number at the opening of the tournament two years ago. The decreased attendance is explained by the extraordinary flood conditions throughout the south. Memphis, Vicksburg, Greenville, New Orleans and other cities in the Mississippi valley which are usually represented in force on such occasions are conspicuous by their absence this year, there being present only a few persons from that section of the country. In many cases railroad schedules in the Mississippi valley are so badly disrupted that it was impracticable to make the trip, and in other cases the delayed planting operations made it extremely inconvenient for numbers of sportsmen, large planters, to leave home at such a critical juncture. The floods have been more general and the hampered business conditions, the result of the extraordinary weather all this year, of greater extent than generally realized. Secretary Shaner of the Interstate association said yesterday that up in Kentucky one rather important shoot had been called off on account of these conditions.

The number of entries at the Southern handicap on Thursday will be considerably in excess of 80, however for other shooters are yet to arrive, and then there will be a number of complimentary entries at the handicap, in accordance with the custom.

Huff Opens Shoot.

The tournament was officially opened at 9:45 o'clock yesterday morning, the first shot being fired by Walter Huff, of Macon.

Nine o'clock was the time set for the opening but it was deferred on account of a party of shooters being delayed in reaching the city. This party wired Secretary Shaner from a point in North Carolina Monday night stating that their train had been delayed by high water, and as a matter of courtesy the formal opening of the shoot was deferred until they could reach the city.

The program yesterday consisted of ten events of 15 targets each and 25 double targets.

In the double target contest in the afternoon, Lester S. German, Aberdeen, Md., made the record. Out of 25 pairs of birds that flew out, he brought down all except one lone target that managed to elude the load of shot and sailed serenely away until it finally fell down near the river bank. A record of 49 out of 50 in doubles is remarkable.

An amateur, Henry W. Kahler, of Philadelphia, tied with W. H. Heer, professional, for second place in the double-target shooting, breaking 47 out of the 50 targets.

A Student's Excellent Work.

The youngest trap shooter in the bunch was Vassa Cates of Brunswick Ga., aged eighteen, a student of Stone Mountain. Mr. Cates, who has been shooting three or four years, obtained leave of absence from the academy at Stone Mountain to take part in this tournament. He is attended by his father Dr. Cate. In the singles he broke 142 out of 150 targets, and in the doubles made a score of 45 out of 50.

President Skelly Arrives.

T. J. Skelly of Wilmington, N. C. president of the Interstate Association for the encouragement of trap shooting, was among the prominent arrivals yesterday morning and will remain on the scene until the last gun is fired. Mr. Skelly is one of the officials of the E. I. du Pont de Nemours Powder Company.

Maxwell's One Miss.

George Maxwell's one miss in the 150 singles yesterday was when a group of gentlemen strolled over from the office of the building to see him shoot. The manner in which he handled the gun with his one arm was wonderful, and they were curious to note the exact man-

ner in which he manipulated the weapon. It was just a happen-so, of course, but just as the admiring group came up in the rear he made his one solitary miss in the entire 150 events.

The following shooters, all professionals, scored 147: H. D. Gibbes, W. R. Crosby, John R. Taylor, W.

Henderson and Homer Clark.

J. W. Hightower, of Americus, and H. B. Pottinger, made the highest records in the singles, each scoring 144.

The Program Today.

Shooting will begin promptly at nine o'clock this morning. The day's sport will consist of 10 events of 15 targets each and a special event of 25 double targets.

In these events manufacturers' agents, paid representatives, etc., may shoot for targets only.

The southern handicap will be the crowning event of the tournament. It will be given tomorrow afternoon, beginning at two o'clock.

Records of First Day.

Following were the records made yesterday:

HITS AND MISSES

The Georgia Association of Trap Shooters had a narrow escape from entering the temple of fame by an unexpected route when a local printer set it up "Georgia Crap Shooters' Association." Fortunately the proof reader was on the job—for once. But it must be admitted that he did valiant work in this instance.

R. O. Helkes, one of the big shooters who planned to attend the Southern tournament, is conspicuous by his absence. He was kept at home by illness in his family. Mr. Helkes is one of the Remington Arms—U. M. C. experts.

The "boy shooter," Vassa Cate, was right on the firing line yesterday. The Brunswick lad made one of the highest records of all the amateurs.

An indispensable feature of all big American trap shooting events is Charles North. Just as it was related of a certain gentleman, "Jones, he pays the freight," so it can be said, "North, he fixes the traps." Mr. North has been on the job during the Columbus tournament, and in his usual expert manner. He is in general charge of the traps, and this is a more important job than might be supposed. From Columbus Mr. North goes to Sunbury, Pa., where he officiates at a Quaker tournament.

Among the trophies to be contested for and won during this tournament is the Carpenter Cafe trophy. This is a silver cup, donated by W. E. Carpenter, proprietor of the Carpenter cafe, to the amateur contestant who makes the highest general average shooting in all events scheduled at double targets.

Guy Ward has reached the scene of action and figured in the day's shooting all right, as the average sheet shows. Mr. Ward is from Reelfoot Lake, a region that was absorbing the choicest talent of the Associated Press and other newsgathering agencies just two or three years ago.


Dr. William Harold is among the Macon sportsmen present. Another gentleman from Macon is B. S. Walker, Jr., a prominent real estate man of that city.




Ct Macon, Who Fired the First Gun in the Southern Tournament.

HEER ONE OF WORLD'S GREAT SHOOTERS

W. H. Heer, of Concordia, Kan., who is representing the Remington Arms Company and the Union Metallic Cartridge Company at this tournament is well known as the winner of the High Professional Average at targets for 1910. It was the first time that competitors for the high professional average had been compelled to compete with other contestants at the regular tournaments held by the Interstate association. Under these conditions fair and equal to all, and shooting in competition with the best marksmen in

the world, Billy Heer made the remarkable score of 1955 out of 2,000, thereby winning the professional

average for the season of 1910 with the highest yearly percentage ever made—97.75 per cent. Also in 1906 Mr. Heer won the highest honor by scoring 96.3 per cent on 14,055 targets, beating all competitors and creating a world's record score.

As an amateur Mr. Heer won every championship for which he contested among them being the state championships of Kansas, Nebraska and Oklahoma, and as a professional at Des Moines, Ia., (1905) in a three-day tournament over three set of traps broke 594 out of a possible 600—making at that time a run of 307 consecutive hits. He also was a member of the famous UMC Southern Squad which broke 488 out of 500 targets at Palestine, Texas, in 1904.

The feature of the second day of the Southern handicap tournament was the feat of Gentry Hillman, an amateur of Birmingham, Ala., in smashing 148 out of 150 targets, shooting at singles.

Mr. Hillman did not make the high record of the day, for W. Henderson, of Kentucky, and H. D. Freeman, of Atlanta, professionals, both scored 148. At the same time it was a wonderful record for an amateur to make and was the one topic among those who witnessed the day's shooting.

George W. Maxwell the one-armed shooter of Hastings, Neb., who led only one bird in escape in a total of 10 singles, Tuesday still holds the record for highest score in shooting at that number of targets consecutively, although in yesterday's shooting three men were just one target behind him.

Gentry Gillman, who made the amateur record Wednesday, is a prominent business man of Birmingham, being connected with one of the coal and iron companies there. He is a cousin of J. H. Hillman, of

Nashville, himself a crack shot.

Kahler Wins Carpenter Cup.

Yesterday's shooting in doubles determined the ownership of the handsome Carpenter Cafe trophy, won by H. W. Kahler, a prominent amateur of Philadelphia. This cup was to be awarded to the "amateur contestant who makes highest general average shooting in all events scheduled at double targets." Mr. Kahler broke 42 out of 25 double targets yesterday. On Tuesday his record in doubles was 47, and thus the record for the two days was 89 out of 100 targets. The Carpenter Trophy, a beautiful silver cup, has been on exhibition in one of the show windows at Charles W. Mizell's.

Wednesday's High Records.

The high record in the singles yesterday—148—was made by Messrs. Freeman, Henderson and Hillman, as already stated. Both the professionals used Peters shells.

The next highest record made in the singles by professionals was 147, and was made by Fred Gilbert, John R. Taylor and W. R. Crosby, who thus tied for second place. Mr. Gilbert is with the DuPont company and Mr. Crosby and Mr. Taylor are both with the Winchester people.

For second place among the amateurs in the singles, J. W. Hightower, of Americus, Ga., and George

Collins of Due West, S. C., tied, each scoring 145.

A Very Close Race.

The race between the big professionals for the first place in this tournament is very close.

On Tuesday, out of a possible 200 (the combined total of singles and doubles) Fred Gilbert and George W. Maxwell each scored 192.

Yesterday, out of a total of 200, J. R. Taylor, W. Henderson and H. D. Freeman, each scored 192.

Thus the high record for each day was 192, and on both days at least two persons made this score.

Gentry Hillman led all amateurs yesterday, scoring 190 out of a possible 200 targets, and it will be seen that he was only two targets behind the professionals when both singles and double target records were consolidated.

MRS. TOPPERWEIN'S EXCELLENT RECORD

Woman Shooter Brought
Down 145 Out of 150
Targets.

A woman—Mrs. Adolph Topperwein—is among the crack shots at the present tournament. In yesterday's single-target shooting she missed only five out of 150 targets, being only three birds behind the three men who tied for first place.

Mrs. Topperwein is the wife of Adolph Topperwein, himself a very fine rifle shot, and they reside at San Antonio, Texas. She has been shooting for only about five years, but in that time has developed into the most expert lady shot of the world. She shoots with shotgun, rifle and pistol, being equally skillful with all. With the rifle she has scored 1995 hits out of 2,000 2 1/4 inch blocks thrown into the air at a distance of 20 feet, making a straight run run of 1,437. With the shotgun she has scored 100 straight a great number of times, her longest straight run being 236. She has won many high averages in open competition shooting on equal terms with the best professional and amateur shots in the world and has scored 198 and 200 in a tournament.

At the Pacific coast handicap, held at Seattle, Wash., in 1910, Mrs. Topperwein won high average over a large field of the best shots of the Pacific coast and Canada. On the first day of this shoot she made the remarkable score of 195 out of 200 which included 20 doubles, and on the final day broke the entire program of 100 singles straight. Mrs. Topperwein's score at the grand American Handicap in 1910 was 96 out of 100, shooting from 19 yards.

Mrs. Topperwein uses Winchester rifles and shotguns and Winchester ammunition exclusively and has broken 485 out of 500 targets and 961 out of 1000 thrown at unknown angles. This last performance is a feat unparalleled among women. It required four hours and thirty-five minutes of continuous shooting, and displayed in a prominent manner her wonderful endurance and skill.

COLUMBUS CUP TO BE AWARDED TODAY

The result of today's shooting, in conjunction with the records of the two previous days, will determine the award of the Columbus, Georgia, cup.

This magnificent trophy is now on exhibition in a window at the William Beach Hardware Company store.

In 1910 it was won by C. M. Powers, of Decatur, Ill., and last year by J. R. Graham, of Long Lake, Ill.

Following is the official history of the Columbus cup:

"The Columbus Board of Trade, in

conjunction with the citizens of Columbus, Georgia, offer for competition a silver loving cup, the value of which is \$500, under the following conditions:

"The trophy is to be known as The Columbus, Georgia, Cup and the competition is to be open to amateurs only.

"To be eligible for the trophy a contestant must shoot in all events called for by the program of the Tournament, the Southern Handicap and double target events included, and the contestant making the highest average shooting in all of said

This is a mighty small world after all. On his recent 15-month jaunt around the globe John Philip Sousa, now in attendance on the Southern handicap, encountered Admiral Bleeker in South Africa, the admiral being on a visit to relatives in that quarter of the globe. Admiral Bleeker may not vote in Columbus, but he is a citizen of the town in every other respect, having been formally adopted, by unanimous vote, by the large circle of warm friends that he has here.

H. D. GIBBS, ONE OF THE CRACK SHOTS

H. D. Gibbs, of Union City, Tenn., one of the experts in attendance on the Columbus tournament, is a comparative newcomer among the professional trap shooters of the country, having left the amateur ranks in December 1909. Mr. Gibbs has an enviable reputation as an average winner in his section of the country, and is widely popular among the followers of the sport throughout the south.

He began trap shooting in 1897, shooting in four tournaments. In 1908 he won the Lakes to the Gulf Championship and general amateur average at Greenville, Miss.; also finished second in the Amateur Championship of America at Columbus, Ohio.

One of Mr. Gibbs best performances was at the Arkansas State Shoot, Little Rock, Ark., June 8-10th, 1908. Mr. Gibbs won the High General Average with the excellent score of 521-550 targets. fi

He is one of the steadiest and most consistent shooters facing the the trap today.

"Constant Reader" in his perusal of Tuesday morning's paper may have noticed that an ambitious printer trimmed down George W. Maxwell, the wonderful one-armed trap shooter from Hastings, Neb., who is making such a remarkable record during this tournament. When the Mergenthaler-man set up the account of the gun explosion which robbed Mr. Maxwell of one of his arms, the spirit of rivalry was aroused, and he went the aforesaid gun one better, the concluding section of the headline over the article reading: "Has only one leg." This information was thrown in for good measure, in a spirit of generosity. Seriously: The use of this line of type, a "tag" or guide line, was another one of those typographical errors of the class that has puzzled curious readers since the beginning of time. It was another instance of the wrong line occurring in the right place, or the right line in the wrong place, just as you prefer it.

John Philip Sousa, who makes a habit of attending trap shooting tournaments whenever he can, this being his favorite sport, may never know the narrow escape that he had at a city he visited recently. One of the reporters was writing up his visit to the town and wanted to say something nice about the great bandmaster. The scores showed that Mr. Sousa was a crack shot, even if his reputation hadn't established this fact, unaided. So, the reporter wrote in describing his prowess with a gun: "Mr. Sousa is one of the greatest cracksmen in the country." "Cracksmen" sounded mighty good, but the editor thought he had better look it up, and a slight alteration was made in the copy.

Henry Crichton, of Lummerton, S. C., a former Columbus boy, is among the visiting shooters from North Carolina.

It is expected that the attendance at the shoot this afternoon will be, by far, the greatest of the week. The attraction will be the Southern handicap shoot, the crowning feature of the tournament.

The equipment at the Columbus Gun Club grounds is such that 50,000 targets a day could be thrown. It is estimated that in the tournament two years ago 75,000 targets were fired at.

The one weak point about the Columbus Gun Club grounds is that the background is not perfect. In places the green background below the skyline is so dark that the view of the flying target is not as perfect as might be. Still, it is pointed out that this is a perfectly natural background, this mixture of sky and trees, with most of it open, and that it is as fair to one as it is to all, as all have to shoot under exactly the same conditions.

Possibly the oldest trap shooter in the country reached Columbus yesterday morning, to attend the tournament. He is Captain Andy Meadows, of Nashville, Tenn., and he enjoys trap shooting above all sports. He

is 70 years of age and has been taking part in tournaments for 40 years or longer. The veteran shooter received a cordial welcome from all his friends when he reached the grounds yesterday morning.

One of the most popular representatives of manufacturers on the grounds this week—and the various companies are represented by an exceptionally bright and clever bunch of men—is E. C. Palmer, of Americus.

Mr. Palmer is a representative of the Remington—U. M. C. Company and is a good one, too. He was a resident of New York up until about a year sport for such a short time. Mr. Riding is at the head of an important department of the Tennessee Coal, Iron & Railroad Company at Birmingham.

J. J. Yates, of Macon, is among the popular and hustling members of the Winchester delegation, this company enjoying exceptionally effective representation during this tournament.

The Columbus Gun Club has been

an ideal host this week, and many pleasant things have been said by visitors regarding its cordial hospitality. George H. Waddell is president, William B. Beach secretary and Robert S. Grier treasurer of the club, and the officers and many of the members have been on the grounds every day this week.

Two years ago the statement was made that names of 15 men present at the tournament could be placed in a hat and ten of the names drawn out, indiscriminately, and the ten would form a squad of shooters that could not be defeated by a similar squad anywhere in the world. The statement was made to emphasize the fact that practically all the brightest trap shooting talent in America—the real big fellows, the topnotchers among the professionals—were then gathered in Columbus. The same statement could doubtless be made today, and with equal truth.

"Well, how are you George?" a Columbus friend asked George L. Lyon, formerly with the Remington U. M. C. people, now retired from the shooting game in a professional way, and president of a railroad at Durham, N. C. "Well, I certainly like that!" exclaimed Mr. Lyon, as he heartily shook hands with his Columbus friend. "Call me 'George'—that's the way I like to hear it. A lot of these fellows started the 'Mr. Lyon' racket, and I had to call 'em down, good and proper." Mr. Lyon is a Columbus booster, and it would take several columns to print all the good things that he says about this city and its people.

Thomas K. Peabody has been among the clerical experts keeping the records straight in the gun club office this week, where the scores have been filled out, averages made, moneys apportioned, etc. It has been a very busy week with the gentlemen in charge of the clerical end of the big shoot.

WINS CUP

H. W. Kahler, of Philadelphia, who captured the Columbus, Georgia, cup, also won the handsome Carpenter Cafe trophy, a beautiful cup given by William E. Carpenter. Mr. Kahler also won second money in the handicap, receiving about \$150. He will thus carry to his home at Philadelphia several interesting souvenirs of his Columbus trip.

Shoot Largely Attended.

The closing day of the shoot was largely attended, the Southern handicap, in the afternoon, bringing out the largest crowd of the entire week. The bleachers were all occupied, and the progress of the shoot, especially toward the last, when the Columbus, Georgia, cup, a \$500 trophy, was hanging in the balances, was watched with keen interest.

Kahler a Noted Amateur.

Harry W. Kahler, who won the local trophies and pulled down second money in the handicap, is among the most noted of American amateur trap shooters, although only 25 years of age. In 1911 he won the amateur championship of the world, his score being 173 out of 200. He made a world's record for an amateur at the handicap at Pinehurst, N. C., in February last, when, standing at the 21-yard post, he scored 98 out of 100 shots. In the Southern handicap yesterday Mr. Kahler suffered the extreme handicap—23 yards. He used a single gun, shooting Peters shells.

Mr. Kahler is with the American Aniline & Extract Company, of Philadelphia, dealers in dyestuffs, etc. This is his first visit to Columbus and he is charmed with the city.

What Other Winners Used.

Vassa Cate shot with a Winchester gun, using Remington shells.

H. D. Freeman, who made the professional high score for the shoot, did the work with a Winchester gun, firing Peters cartridges.

H. B. Pottinger, who made amateur high record, used a Winchester gun and shells.

Fred Gilbert, who led all for the entire tournament with his 565-out-of-600 record, is with the du Pont powder people. He used a Parker gun, and Winchester shells.

Freeman's Perfect Score

The only perfect score of the entire tournament was made yesterday morning by H. D. Freeman, the Atlanta professional, when he had a straight run of 100 targets. There were five events of 20 birds each, singles, and not miss was recorded in the entire 100 shots. The shooting was done at 16 yards.

EMPTY SHELLS

The date and place of the next Southern Handicap will not be determined until some months later. Columbus has been the scene of two of the seven Southern handicaps, which is not a bad record at all.

Secretary-Treasurer Shaner of the Interstate Association was busily engaged last night in winding up the details of the tournament, and plans to leave the city today, going to his home at Pittsburgh. Mr. Shaner who is very fond of Columbus and Columbus people, had many pleasant things to say about the city last evening. The manager of the Interstate association is genuinely popular with Columbus shooters, and no

where in the south has he a larger circle of warm friends than here in Columbus.

Guy Moore had the honor of paring the last shot in the Southern handicap.

"Take the professionals, for instance—the very nature of their work makes it necessary for them to be temperate and careful in their living, and we all know that temperance, in the broad sense of the word, is a character-builder. These men cannot even afford to smoke, if it gets on their nerves at all, as for drinking intoxicants, that is simply not to be thought of. A fellow has to have a cool brain, a clear vision, muscles that obey his bidding absolutely, good judgment and nerves that are under perfect control, to be a successful trap shooter.

Fred Slear, the assistant gun editor and cartoonist on Sporting Life, a Philadelphia sporting publication, was present and drew an amusing poster from life of John Philip Sousa, the bandmaster, on his famous six-day horseback journey from Hot Springs to Washington, which was tacked to the side of the clubhouse.

The likeness of Mr. Sousa was excellent, and it created much amusement, especially to Mr. Sousa himself, who laughed heartily when he viewed the caricature.

Mr. Sousa stated to an Every Evening reporter that he would open the season at Willow Grove Park with his famous band, on August 25th, remaining there until September 8th. He will open at Ocean City, N. J., on August 15th.

A fine, large pen-and-ink cartoon by Mr. Slear, donated to the du Pont Gun Club by Sporting Life, is on exhibition inside the clubhouse, which shows Messrs. Doremus and Skelley caring for a baby, which is the gunclub, and the baby's uncle, T. Coleman du Pont, is making it a present of guns, spoons and toys.

Mr. Sousa's gun created much admiration among the spectators, it being one of the most finely-engraved guns ever seen on the grounds. Mr. Sousa owns the mate to the \$1,500 L. C. Smith gun, exhibited by the Hartlove Gun Co. at the sportsmen's show in Turn Hall.

SOUSA SHOTS FOURTH IN NICHOLSON SHOOT



COMPLETE PLANS FOR GREAT SHOOT

John Philip Sousa Among En-
trants in Grand American
Handicap

EXPERTS DUE TO
ARRIVE SUNDAY

John Philip Sousa is known throughout the world as the greatest living band master. There may be residents of Springfield, however, who are not aware that he is one of the most able trap shooters in the United States as well. He will be in Springfield next week to try for the championship in the grand American handicap shoot.

Mr. Sousa is only one of the list of almost 350 of the best shots in the world whose names have been sent to Elmer E. Shaner, secretary-treasurer for the interstate association, under whose auspices the annual shoot is held. Mr. Shaner has arrived in Springfield from his home at Pittsburg, Pa., to take charge of the entries and other details of arrangement for the big shoot. He says that the number of entries, all told, should fall very little below 400 marksmen.

Few Southern Marksmen.

Floods and a backward planting season throughout the south have materially curtailed the number of shooters from that section of the country. Otherwise, the list this year would have exceeded that of any former handicap, officials believe.

The handicapping committee has been in session at the St. Nicholas hotel since early today in an effort to complete the arrangement of handicaps for announcement tomorrow. The committee includes James W. Bell of St. Louis, A. C. Connors of Springfield, Ray E. Loring of Marseilles, Ill.; Frank Fuller of Mukwonago, Wis., and John H. Noel of Nashville, Tenn.

Local Grounds Put in Shape.

At the Illinois Gun club grounds, where the contest is to be held, elaborate arrangements have been made by the local gunmen for the accommodation and comfort of shooters and spectators. Five new traps have been installed and are pronounced perfect by many shooters, who have used them. Check rooms, shelter and dressing tents, a refreshment tent and a big tent equipped with seats for several hundred spectators have been installed.

Secretary-treasurer Shaner, who has managed every Grand American shoot since the institution of the annual event twenty years ago, highly commended the members of the local club today for the adequate arrangements made for handling the shoot.

Springfield to Be Represented.

Springfield will be well represented among the hundreds of crack shots present. Among local amateurs who have displayed remarkable class behind the traps are A. C. Connor and Dr. J. R. Leib. Edward Bogardus, son of Captain A. H. Bogardus, one time the world's champion all around shot, is another Springfieldian, who will shoot for grand American honors.

Perhaps no more interesting aggregation of sportsmen will ever assemble in Springfield than those whose names are listed as entries for the coming handicap battle. Among them is Captain "Andy" Meadows of Nashville, Tenn., the oldest marksman entered thus far. Although more than 70 years old, he maintains a keen interest and a high score behind the flying targets. He is an amateur.

Noted Arms Expert Coming.

Then there is J. A. Prechtel of Cleveland, O., an amateur who possesses an

intimate knowledge of the construction of firearms as well as their use. At last year's handicap, held at Columbus, O., Prechtel obligingly overhauled and repaired a gun which had gone bad in the hands of another contestant. In five minutes after the gun had balked, it was handed back to its owner in condition which enabled him to continue in the contest with good results. Prechtel repairs guns for fun, just as he shoots them.

Riley Thompson of Kanesville, Mo., who broke 100 straight targets and won over Harvey McMurchy of Syracuse, N. Y., after the latter had broken ninety-nine out of a hundred "birds" in the 1910 handicap, will also be present. McMurchy will be here again, too, in the hope of evening the score. Harve Dixon of Oronogo, Mo., winner of last year's grand American, will attempt to repeat his performance.

Californians to Participate.

J. A. Blunt of Greensboro, Ala., an amateur sportsman with whom the public is familiar as groomsmen at the wedding of Richmond P. Hobson, the hero of Santiago bay, will also seek the American championship. T. D. Riley will travel more than 2,000 miles to reach Springfield for the national event. His home is at San Francisco, Calif.

Others in the galaxy of top notch marksmen who will shoot in the amateur classic are: Harry W. Kabler, Philadelphia, Pa., winner of the Pinehurst handicap last January; C. D. Eaton, Fayette, Mo.; John Martin, Brooklyn, N. Y.; Guy V. Deering, Columbus, Wis.; E. R. Alexander, Tuskegee, Ala.; F. S. Wright, South Wales, N. Y.; J. S. Young, Chicago; George J. GEORGETOWN PLEASURE GROUNDS.

NORTHERNERS BUY TRACT OF
6,500 ACRES.

Richfield Plantation, Old Rice Fields and Timber Land Sold to Syndicate for Preserve—Sousa and Eugene DuPont Among Purchasers—Many Fine Preserves in Georgetown.

Georgetown, June 21.—Special: "Richfield plantation," on the Santee River, a tract of 6,500 acres of land, some of it well timbered, a considerable area under cultivation in upland crops and the rest abandoned rice lands, has been sold recently by the former rice planting firm of Ward & Co to a party of capitalist sportsmen, namely, John Philip Sousa, James Kelly and Eugene DuPont, of New York and Wilmington, Del. Mr DuPont is a member of the big powder manufacturing concern, which, in connection with its powder industry, have established at Georgetown an immense plant for the production of ethel alcohol, a valuable ingredient in the manufacture of explosives. It was largely through the influence of Mr DuPont, who has been on the ground frequently, and is aware of the splendid shooting advantages of this section of country, that these Northern gentlemen of great wealth have purchased "Richfield" for hunting purposes.

The place is well stocked with game, such as deer, wild turkeys, ducks in season, quail and game birds of every variety. It is said to be one of the finest localities for mallard duck shooting to be found in the United States during the winter months. There is also a trout pond on the place, and first-class fishing can be had in all the surrounding waters. It is situated only a few miles from the sea. There is a hunting lodge already on the place, which will probably be remodelled for the millionaire sportsmen's use this winter, as a temporary abode. It is said, however, that the gentlemen in question, and probably others of their friends, will form an exclusive hunting club and make a model winter resort and hunting preserve of the estate, and that a fine automobile track will be built to the property from Georgetown, a distance of fourteen miles, in order to secure quick access by land from this city. Easy access can also be had by water.

Rich sportsmen from the North and West are fast coming here to secure a winter home and good shooting for several months each year, and all who are here are well satisfied with their holdings. Among those who have in the past few years acquired large estates in Georgetown County are Mr Bernard M. Baruch, of New York; Capt Isaac E. Emerson, of Baltimore; Mr Wayne Darlington, of Idaho; Capt J. L. Wheeler, of Marion, S. C., all for purposes of sport, primarily, though most of them are making model farms of their properties as well. It is reported that a number of others are interested in the hunting advantages of this county, and are expected to invest in some plantations in the vicinity, which are on the market, within the present year.

W. E. PHILLIPS OF CHICAGO IS THE 1912 WINNER OF GRAND AMERICAN HANDICAP EVENT

**CAPTURES TOURNAMENT CLASSIC AFTER SHOOT-
ING OFF TIE WITH H. D. DUCKHAM—LIPPOTT
OF ELKHART MAKES GOOD SCORE.**

W. E. Phillips, a member of the South Shore Country club of Chicago, won the Grand American handicap at the Illinois Gun club here yesterday after shooting off a tie with H. D. Duckham of Kenton, Ohio. Each broke ninety-six out of 100 birds.

Yesterday's weather was far and away the best that has been the lot of the Grand American handicap tournament this week, at least until just before the close of the day, when a heavy rain and thunderstorm passed over the grounds of the Illinois Gun club and put a stop to the proceedings for a sufficiently long period of time to make it quite late when everything was over for the day.

The Grand American handicap, the feature of the entire tournament, was almost over when the storm broke, less than 200 targets being all that had to be thrown when the storm passed away. But prior to the rain, there had been for some time a strong, gusty wind that played havoc with the scores, and made many a good chance "for the money" go a-glimmering. This was particularly the case with W. Hoon's chance. When he went up for the last string of his 100 targets, he had already scored seventy-seven out of eighty. He thus had a chance to win if he broke "straight," and a chance to tie with a nineteen. But the added handicap of a tricky and strong wind was too much; he dropped three targets and went out with ninety-four, a tie for fourth place.

Mr. Phillips and M. Duckham shot off the tie immediately on No. 3 trap.

Phillips Is Easy Winner.

Both men were on the same mark in the handicap, viz., nineteen yards. A close and exciting shoot-off was expected, but the same did not materialize, as Mr. Phillips won out easily with 17 to 15, never being in any sort of trouble after the fifth round. He lost his first, sixteenth, and eighteenth targets, while his opponent lost third, fourth, sixth, twelfth and thirteenth.

With 358 fully paid up entries, the first round showed that there were just 355 starters, three having failed to answer to their names when called to the score. Of the above number 302 were amateurs, and 53 professionals, the latter not being eligible to compete for the purse, but contesting for a special prize donated by the Interstate association. This prize, a handsome gold watch, was won by C. A. "Sparrow" Young of Springfield, Ohio, with 95 out of 100 from 22 yards. Fred Gilbert at 23 yards and John W. Garrett at 22 yards, and Ed Graham at 22 yards, tied with 94; Homer Clark at 22 yards and Del Gross at 20 yards tied on 93.

Elkhart Man Shoots Well.

Among the amateurs, Max Kneussell of Ottawa, Ill., won third money with 95 from 20 yards. There were three 94s, Captain Andy Meaders of Nashville, Tenn.; W. S. Hoon and M. L. Lippott of Elkhart. The other money winners were the eight who made 93, eight 92s, twelve 91s and twenty-four 90s. Thus 58 of the 302 amateurs made 90 per cent or better and "landed in the money."

The total purse, made up of entry fees and the cash (\$500) added by the Interstate association amounted to \$3,192, making first money \$319.20, to which the association added a further sum of \$680.80, to make up the "\$1,000 guaranteed to the winner." Second money was \$287.30, third \$255.35, while the three 94s each got \$191.50.

Today's Events End Shoot.

Today's events, which will bring this great tournament to a close, are as follows: The amateur championship at doubles, the professional championship at doubles and the consolation handicap. The amateur championship at doubles is at 50 pairs (targets thrown two at a time), 16 yards rise, \$10 entrance, \$100 added to the purse. The professional championship at doubles is shot under the same conditions but no money is added to the purse. Entries for these events close at 10 o'clock this morning. The consolation handicap entries closed last night with a total of 97 contestants. The conditions are 100 targets, same handicaps as in the Grand American Handicap, but money winners in that event barred from competing in the consolation handicap. This event will be the first on today's program for decision and will be started promptly at 9 o'clock.

Previous winners of the grand American handicap competing in yesterday's events were five in number, Messrs. Heikes, winner in 1901, when he scored 91 from twenty-two yards; R. R. Barber in 1905, with 99 out of 100 from sixteen yards; Jeff J. Blanks in 1907, with 96 out of 100 from 17 yards; Riley Thompson, winner in 1909 with 100 straight from nineteen yards, and last year's winner, Harvey Dixon, who won with 99 out of 100 from twenty yards.

H. D. Duckham, the runner-up in yesterday's event, made a start that would have disheartened most men, for he dropped three targets in his first string which he shot on trap No. 2. He then tightened up, ran the next three events without a miss, and only dropped a single target in his last string which he had to shoot over the unpopular Trap No. 1.

W. E. Phillips, the winner, commenced his work on No. 4 trap with a "20 straight." He followed this with a 19 on trap No. 5 and a 17 on the Jonah trap, but finished with 40 straight in the last two strings.

John Philip Sousa landed in the select class yesterday, scoring 90 in good shape and has every chance of interviewing the cashier with satisfactory results this morning. Mrs. Topperwein scored the same as in the preliminary handicap, an 89 from the 20-yards mark. She had a 19, two 18s and two 17s recorded for her.

Captain "Andy" Meaders made another popular winning yesterday, finishing a tie for fourth, fifth and sixth places with 84 from the seventeen yards mark. Captain Meaders has passed the three score years and ten mark, but he ground out his 94 with the precision of a young expert and incidentally he won't have to walk home.

The moving picture film man was a source of great interest out at the grounds. He said that he had secured enough good material for a first rate film that will show the crowd to a good advantage.

Those who have attended the Grand American handicap for several years say that the crowd of spectators yesterday was the largest of any handicap since the association. The request of the local commercial association was obeyed to the minutest detail and many local people, aside from those visiting with shooters, gathered at the grounds.

Mark Arie of Thomasboro, Ill., won the national amateur championship at double targets, the final event of the grand American handicap shoot, at the Illinois Gun club grounds yesterday afternoon. Arie smashed eighty-nine out of the hundred targets, thrown from the traps in pairs. Harry W. Kahler of Philadelphia, Pa., finished just one target below the winner, while C. M. Powers and H. Dunnill tied for third place with eighty-six hits each. Bert Dunnill of Fox Lake, Ia., Nick Arie, E. S. Rogers and Jesse Young split fourth money with eighty-four targets each. C. C. Collins of All-dine, Ind., and William Ridley broke eighty-three targets each.

Gilbert Leads Professionals.

The professional championship went to Fred Gilbert of Spirit Lake, Ia., who won in the shoot off, after he had tied with J. S. Day of Syracuse, N. Y., Ed. O'Brien and Walter Huff with a score of eighty-four targets. While lower scores prevailed in the professional than in the amateur contest, both were intensely interesting.

to see something of the Grand American Tournament, being held in the field on the outskirts of Harvard, there were three favorite shots. George Maxwell, who, although handicapped by nature with one arm, is one of the finest trap shooters there. The versatile John Philip Sousa, who can forget the band in this recreation, and Mrs. Adolph Topperwein, the best all around wing shot in the world.

These questions were heard continually: "Can you point out Mr. Sousa to me? O, never mind! I see him. My! I'd recognize him anywhere. Isn't he a wonder? They are taking moving pictures, aren't they? Yes; because the photographer is making Sousa come to the front."

"That's Maxwell. Look at him shoot. Does it all with one arm. Got sixty targets out of sixty targets. What do you know about that!"

Talks With Woman Expert.

"Say, I want to see the lady shoot. She and her husband travel all over the country together. He represents the Winchester Arms and she the Dead Shot Powder company. Isn't she pretty? Look at her arm. Brown and strong looking. I wonder when she is going to shoot again. I wouldn't miss her for anything. She looks so sweet and pleasant I believe I'll speak to her. * * * Excuse me, would you please tell me when you are going to shoot?"

Mrs. Topperwein turns around with a bright smile that shows perfect teeth and says as cordially as though the strangers were her oldest friends, "In about thirty minutes. I do hope that you can stay."

At that moment some one is good enough to introduce me to her and I have a chance to ask her all the ques-

tions that I have been burning to put to her ever since I saw her step out with the men, lift the gun (or maybe it's a rifle; anyway I know it wasn't a pistol) to her shoulder and plink away at the funny clay disks that are shot at intervals into the air by a mechanical device.

She and Her Husband Favorites.

She is, to begin with, a very pretty woman, with rippling brown hair and clear brown eyes. She dresses in a flannel shirt, turned down at the neck, rolled up to the elbows, which serves to exhibit the most wonderfully developed pair of brown arms I ever saw on a woman. In perfect physical condition she radiates life and good spirits. I do not wonder that she was sought out on every side when she was not shooting.

She and her husband are great favorites. Every one knows the "Topps," as they are called familiarly, and the "Topps" know every one in turn.

Under Mrs. Topperwein's guidance the gun club began to be a different place. She introduce me to all the celebrities, she explained the handicaps. She told me, last of all, and only on my solicitation, that out of a possible 2,000 shots she had upon one occasion, hit 1,995 targets (the clay pigeons that are made to fly.) She had hit 1,437 straight with a rifle. Nine hundred and sixty-one out of a possible 1,000 with a shotgun. That didn't impress me as much though as when she let me feel her magnificent arm, the great muscles of the forearm, the big biceps, and the development of the shoulder.

"I do not suppose you are ever afraid of anything," I asked her with a sigh. "You wouldn't mind a burglar in the least?"

Her Experience With Negro.

"I never met a burglar" she laughed, "but I did have an experience once when I was glad that I could shoot. It was down in a little Texas town where my husband and I were going to give an exhibition. He left me in my room in the hotel alone. Presently a great colored man knocked on the door and said that he had been sent up to clean the bath room. The bath room was a crude affair partitioned off from my room. He went in there, but was ominously silent. I reached out and got my little pistol and waited. Pretty soon his great black head was thrust cautiously out the door. I didn't take any chances. I just raised that gun and aimed it right at him. He surprised me by crying out "Good Lord! it's de lady shooter" and with that he ran down the

hall and I after him. He disappeared from the hotel and, for all I know, he is running yet."

She laughed delightedly at the memory. "I was right to take no chances. The landlord said that the man was a stranger he had hired the day before. He had had no orders to come to my room for any purpose whatever. I think when he saw me take aim he recognized me from the posters about the town."

Mrs. Topperwein was not content that I should know none of the shooters but herself. She led me from one end to the other of the tent, erected for shade and shelter, and introduced me to all the well known trap shooters of the country. Everyone was pleased to have her stop for a word, many of the men told me not only what a fine shot she was, but what a perfect woman. "She mothers everyone of us," one of them said.

"We met Frank E. Drew, managing salesman of the Winchester arms; we met Mr. Bippus, who is treasurer of the Cash Register company of Dayton, a good shot, a thorough believer that interest in clean sport is the greatest thing in the world to make good men and good women. The story of what the Cash Register does to promote such interest in their employes is a story in itself.

One of Captain's Tricks.

We met Captain Jack Wulf that they call the Millionaire trap shooter, who is famous among the sportsmen for his knack of getting startling novelties. As we spoke to him he pressed his hand to his heart several times. "What's the matter?" someone asked solicitously.

"Heart's acting up," he said. "I guess I stood out in the sun too long."

The questioner with real concern placed her hand on the great strapping Milwaukee's man's side. The heart was indeed beating like a trap hammer.

She started but every one else laughed. It was only another one of Captain Jack's tricks. The heart of rubber, inflated by a hidden bulb.

There was fun and laughter and good clean interest in a good clean sport on every side all day long. If you got tired of the sport you could go into the tent and see Mr. Slear drawing cartoons of everyone from Sousa down to amuse the crowd and advertise "Sporting Life."

From time to time a newsboy passed among them shouting about the headlines of political news, but no one cared much about that. It was more interesting to lean over the fence and watch the sportsmen bring down their birds.

TRAP AVERAGES

SHOW B. LEWIS AND F. GILBERT
LEADING TWO CLASSES

Leaders in Both Amateur and Professional Divisions of "Sporting Life's" Records Have Broken Better Than 96 Per Cent.

Leaders in both the amateur and professional divisions in "Sporting Life's" monthly trap shooting averages, compiled from the official scores of registered tournaments, as published only in "Sporting Life," have topped the 96 per cent. mark. The fourth installment of the averages of shooters competing in registered tournaments of the Interstate Association finds Bart Lewis, of Auburn, Ill., leading all the amateurs of the country who have shot at 750 or more targets, with an average of .9687, made by breaking 1860 targets out of 1930, at which he shot. The leader in the professional ranks is Fred Gilbert, the famous Spirit Lake, Ia., veteran, whose average of .9675 is the highest in either division. Gilbert broke 1548 targets out of 1600. William R. Crosby, another professional, is also above 96 per cent., his figures being .9629. Homer Clark, Lester S. German, Lee Barkley, Fred G. Bills, C. G. Spencer, John R. Taylor, William H. Heer and E. R. Holt follow in order in the professional ranks, all being over 95 per cent. The second amateur is Harry W. Kahler, of Philadelphia, with .9559. Jay Graham, the new Olympic Champion, is third and Frank S. Wright fourth, this quartet being all above 95 per cent. The averages this month are compiled on all tournaments up to number 82, and include 41, 44 and 50, which were not in last month's averages. These averages only include the scores of those who have shot at 750 or more targets, it being found impossible to publish all the averages owing to lack of space. The figure 750 was taken at this stage because it is a proper proportion of targets of the whole number of targets that will be shot this year. The installment next month will include only those who have shot at 1000 or more targets. John Philip Sousa, the famous bandmaster-shooter, still has the credit of shooting at the greatest number of targets. He has fired at 3995, this being higher than any professional. 

Richardson and Bill Joslyn are not to be forgotten as both men in form are capable of toeing the mark with the best squads in the country. Besides them there is the usual number of dark horses who are liable to come through and get the title.

The feature event for the Philadel-

phia shooters is the Caldwell Trophy. The Quaker City shots are here today determined to take back Harry W. Kahler's title and the fight promises to be an interesting one. Kahler, the holder of the trophy, is a professional shooter now in the middle west and is therefore ineligible to compete.

Last night the DuPont Hotel was crowded until midnight by the shotgun populace. THE LIFE STORY OF SLEAR

New Member of Remington Sales Force Went from Farm to Railroad and Then to Art—An Intimate Character Study.

E. F. Slear, whose work and personality are mainly known to the sporting world through the medium of his cartoons and through his shooting at the traps throughout the country, was born on a farm in Pennsylvania. He grew up as he expressed it, in a "Pennsylvania Dutch" atmosphere. Perhaps this is why he draws Irish, Scotch and Indian characters so

well. For the boy Slear there was no "silver spoon" and all the way up through the years, he has grubbed his own way wherever his rather varied career has taken him.

Mr. Slear did not delve into art work to any great extent until long after his love for the gun had brought him into prominence as a shooter. When a young call-boy for the Pennsylvania Railroad at Sunbury, Pa., in 1891, his first job after leaving home, the boy shooter won his first medal, representing the Northumberland County Championship at targets.

For ten years Mr. Slear followed railroading and had fully planned to make that vocation his life's work, but his aptitude for art became so pronounced that friends induced him to take a course at the Philadelphia Museum School of Industrial Art. This was his real start in the field in which he has made his greatest successes.

In 1909 a publication in the sporting field engaged Mr. Slear, and on that publication he has developed many of his unique ideas along the line of illustration and its relation to advertising and circulation boosting. His work has attracted the attention of publication builders throughout the country. Probably from Mr. Slear's treatment of big trap shooting meets in caricature, much of his popularity in the sporting world has arisen. This work has always been characterized by a deep insight into human nature and by a rich humor with no "sting" in it.

To an extent experienced by few contemporaries in his field,

Mr. Slear has rubbed elbows with the people and has brought to his sketches the human touch that found a popularly responsive chord—the touch that has made his picture stories quickly intelligible to a big mass of admirers rather than only guessed at by a wise few. At shoots from coast to coast where he has represented sporting publications, Mr. Slear has been a modest, unassuming "mixer" of the highest type.

He has been a "good fellow" among men—while attending strictly to business—and has never found it necessary to wear long hair or flowing neckties to make his work known or appreciated. One branch of the activities of this Pennsylvania mountain artist has never seen the light of a newspaper column—it is one of his many good works that has been kept in the background. This hail-fellow-well-met comrade of the ruddy outdoor shooter, and most at home in the field or at the traps, has found time during odd hours on his travels up and down the earth, to drop in now and then at country school houses and at little Sunday school sessions and make the children's eyes glow with the tales his crayon so skillfully told. Hundreds of little ones have gone home to tell, for instance, of "the big lions the man drew—they were in a den and there was a man in there with them, and the man's name was Daniel, and the lions wouldn't touch Daniel because God wouldn't let them." Is it any wonder that this artist found the "human touch?"

Those who have had the pleasure of working in collaboration with Mr. Slear speak of him as a "quick study," to use a theatrical term, that is, he has the faculty of almost instantly developing a suggestion in its perfected form from the merest hint, and much of his best work has been done amid the excitement of shooting contests where he has sketched the contestants "off hand" in the open field.

Should Mr. Slear's new work with the Remington Arms-Union Metallic Cartridge Company take him away from his broad activities in sporting affairs there will be general regret. We are assured that even wider avenues will be found for his talent and that the artist will not be entirely lost in the work of the salesman.

Georgia State Shoot.

The following scores were made at the two-day state tournament held at Americus, Georgia, May 7 and 8, under the auspices of the Americus Gun Club.

Mr. J. M. Barrett, of Augusta, Ga., won the Georgia State Championship on the fine score of 98 out of 100. Mr. Henry Jones, of Macon, Ga., tied Mr. Barrett on 98, but lost on shoot-off, 18 to Mr. Barrett's 20 straight.

Mr. Henry Jones, of Macon, Ga., won the high amateur

average by breaking 385 out of 400; Mr. J. M. Barrett, second, 384 out of 400; J. W. Hightower, third, 393 out of 400.

Double championship was won by Mr. John K. Warren, of Birmingham, Ala., on 44 out of 50. Mr. E. H. Eubanks, of Atlanta, Ga., tied Mr. Warren on 44, but lost on shoot-off.

This shoot was very highly praised by visiting shooters; all seem to be unanimous on especially praising the grounds, club house and general arrangements for shooters.

One world's record was smashed and two Alabamians gave indication that they would be formidable contenders in the classic Southern Handicap today in the second day of the Interstate Association trap shooting tournament at the grounds of the Capital City Gun Club at Pickett Springs.

The record was made by a squad of five professionals, shooting 500 targets. They were F. G. Bills, W. R. Crosby, Fred Gilbert, J. R. Graham and W. H. Heer. Their total score was 493 out of a possible 500. The previous record was 491. The shooting was especially remarkable in view of the fact that throughout the morning, when the record was made, a high wind was blowing which interfered with the gunmen's accuracy.

In the preliminary handicap, there were ninety-three entries and it is expected that today in the handicap, Birmingham's record of 116 shooters made in 1908 will be passed by a goodly margin. Though the wind was blowing high, there were some fair scores made. The handicap finally resolved itself into a contest between J. K. Warren, of Birmingham, a prominent hardware merchant and Ted Alexander, a well known attorney of Chicago. When they had shot at the 100 targets they were tied and then fired at an extra twenty targets to decide their supremacy. Warren won by two birds.

It is expected that today there will be a number of local entries, while the crowd of spectators has been increasing all along.

Handicap Committee Meets.

Final meeting of the handicap committee was held yesterday afternoon at the shooting grounds to fix the handicaps for the big day. The committee was governed largely by the showing of the various contestants yesterday in declaring their distance from the traps today. Those who governed this feature were Will T. Laslie of Tuskegee; A. Ross, of Montgomery; G. H. Waddell, of Columbus, Ga.; Charles Green, of Laurel, Miss., and Gentry Hillman, of Birmingham. Their decision will not be announced until the men are ready to face the marks at 9 o'clock this morning.

The handicap is for 100 single targets \$10 entrance—targets included—handicaps 16 to 23 yards, high guns—not class shooting, \$200 added to the purse.

The winner of first money is guaranteed \$200 or more and a trophy; the winner of second money is guaranteed \$150 or more; and the winner of third money is guaranteed \$100 or more.

If first, second or third money fall beneath these amounts, the difference will be made good by the Interstate Association. The event is open to amateurs only but manufacturers' agents, paid representatives, etc., may shoot for "targets only."

GRAHAM, OLYMPIC CHAMPION, HIGH GUN AT BIG STATE SHOOT

Winner of Trapshooting Event at Stockholm Breaks 196 Out of Possible 200 at Kenilworth — O. E. Carpenter Leads Amateurs With 191.

Getting the dust out of their eyes and familiarizing themselves with the far-stretching background of the Kenilworth race track, over 100 gunners, the best professionals and amateurs from all over the United States and Canada, yesterday participated in ten events at twenty targets each. It was the first "regular" day's shoot if the programme for the New York State Sportsmen's association and the old-timers mingled with the youngsters, some of them for the first time.

First honors for the day fell to Jay R. Graham, world's champion, famous as the man who captured first honors for America in the clay pigeon shooting contest at the Olympic games at Stockholm. Graham was in superb shooting form, breaking 196 out of a possible 200. He wound up with eighty straight "kills" or breaks, and his performance was easily the feature of the day. Other professionals who made good scores were W. R. Crosby with 194, W. H. Stevens 191, and Lester German, the old baseball pitcher, 191.

O. E. Carpenter was high man among the amateurs, his 191 being top score for the day. J. D. Green was but a single target behind him, breaking 190. Frank S. Wright, the western New York champion, broke 184. George Brown and A. E. Conley show in the figures at 183.

Among the notables present were John Philip Sousa, the "March King," who broke 186; H. H. Stevens, without whom no shoot would be complete; Stephen D. Fowler of Wolcott, N. Y., seventy-one years old, the oldest trap shot in the state; Sim Glover, who has been shooting over the traps for years, and many others.

Today the Big Day.

Today will be the big day of the meet. Besides the programme of 150 targets, the big merchandise shoot will be held. This event will be shot under the "Lewis" system, all contestants standing at sixteen yards. The traps, placed in position and managed by H. E. Winans, gave perfect satisfaction and, as predicted, increased the shooting averages of a number of amateurs. PRACTICE DAY.

In the regular events, among the professionals, W. H. Heer and Homer Clark were in first place with 99 out of the 100 targets shot at; W. R. Crosby and F. Gilbert were in second place with 98, and L. S. German, J. T. Skelly and Walter Huff were in third place with 97.

The Columbus, Georgia, Cup was won by Mr. W. H. Jones, of Macon, Ga., with a score of 563 out of 600 targets shot at. The Columbus, Georgia, Cup event included all single, double and handicap target events scheduled for the tournament, with the exception of practice day.

During the tournament a total of 63,070 targets were trapped.

Mr. Skelly also presented, in behalf of the Capital City Gun Club, gold handled umbrellas to Messrs. Squier, Winans and Shaner in appreciation of services rendered during the tournament.

After speeches were made by Messrs. Warren and Joerg, the trophy winners, and by Messrs. Squier, Winans and Shaner, the tournament was officially declared closed.

DICKEY LEADS TARGET FIELD IN STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

A. B. Richardson Ties For Second Honors With Cream of East's Best Target Shots---Seventy-one Contestants Line Up at du Pont Gun Club.

Yesterday was the first day of the Second Annual Tournament of the Delaware State Sportsmen's Association, and the duPont Gun Club on whose grounds it was held was favored with just about the right kind of weather for such a gathering. There were exactly 71 shooters on hand, the number no doubt being kept down by the variety and number of attractions offered to the holiday seekers, in the shape of baseball games, picnics, etc. Still, seventy-one, and a classy seventy-one at that, is by no means a gathering of shooters to be sneezed at anywhere or on any day. To-day however, there will be a much larger crowd it is expected, as the merchandise event, the last event on to-day's program is always a very popular event and several handsome and valuable prizes have been collected by the club management to be put up for competition.

Yesterday's program consisted of ten events at fifteen targets each, or a total of 150 in the regular events, while tacked on the end of the program was a special event, known as "The Wolf Event" in which the targets, 25 per man were thrown at least 60 yards from expert traps at unknown traps and unknown angles, the hardest style of shooting, as was shown by the comparatively poor scores made. The best scores in the event were made by H. E. Buckwalter of Royersford, Pa., who broke 20 and by John Philip Sousa, the "March King" who won second prize with 19, especially good work when it is considered that it was Mr. Sousa's first effort at that style of shooting. The Wilmingtonian W. S. Colfax, Jr., who is not eligible for the prizes, and who is now shooting in top notch form, broke 20 and tied Mr. Buckwalter.

O. R. Dickey High Gun.

On the 150 targets shot at in the regular events, O. R. Dickey, a professional and one of the pioneers in trapshooting, who hails from Boston, cleaned up the bunch by breaking 144 out of 150. In making this score Mr. Dickey missed his seventh or eighth trap in the second event and then ran straight ahead until he let the fourteenth target in his seventh event get away from his charge of shot, his long run being thus almost 90 straight. Next to him came four amateurs—C. H. Newcomb of Philadelphia, A. B. Richardson of Dover, one of Delaware's best experts, H. E. Buckwalter of Royersford, Pa., one of the old guard in the amateur ranks, and Allen Heil of Allentown, all four of whom broke 143. A. B. Richardson was the winner of the Amateur State Championship of Delaware during the state shoot of last May 29 and 30, and by his steady shooting promises to carry off the same honors this year. Allen Heil holds the honor of 1912 Doubles Champion at Interstate Association tournaments. Two Wilmingtonians, W. M. Foord and W. S. Colfax the duPont Gun Club professional and one of the best shots at this time, were tied for third honors with Jno. L. Englert of Allentown, Pa., on 141 breaks. George S. McCarty, the Philadelphia crack shot finished

the day with 141. It will be remembered that Mr. McCarty as recently as May 2 won the open competition for the Wawset Trophy, open to any shooter resident within 200 hundred miles of the city of Wilmington, breaking 100 straight in the match in a most impressive manner. Mr. Sousa's shooting was by no means up to the form he has been displaying of late, for he has been shooting in great form during the past few weeks. He attributed his decline in form to an attack of stiffness due to the rather strenuous horse back ride which he has made for the past few days, only reaching the Hotel duPont Thursday afternoon in time for a little practice, at which he ran a nice total of 90 breaks out of 100 shot at, notwithstanding the fact that the wind was blowing quite strongly at the time.

For Trophy Titles.

Yesterday's scores counted for two trophies and titles, the ownership title of which will not be decided until event No. 10 on to-day's program has been completed. For instance, the conditions covering the J. E. Caldwell handsome trophy provide for the trophy to be handed over for the years 1913 to 1914, i. e., the months that intervene between this year's state shoot and the third annual in 1914 to the amateur, whether a resident of the state or not, who shall make the highest aggregate on the 300 targets in the two day's regular program events.

The same rules apply to the contest for the Amateur State Championship trophy, known as the duPont Traffic Department Trophy, which was held last year by Mr. Richardson and who seems to have a good look in for continued possession for another twelve months, judging from the start he has made, and from the way he is shooting so consistently well.

To-day's program also calls for a decision as to who shall have the right to the title of State Champion

the cup emblem of the Open Championship of the State. This will be decided in the last 100 targets on the regular program for to-day. The competition for this trophy is likely to be keen.

The special merchandise event at 25 targets per man will also be decided this p. m., and with the long list of valuable trophies offered for competition among the amateurs, in state and out of state, should prove a great attraction.

Taken altogether to-day's program is an excellent one, and one which the good management of the office force, Messrs. Lloyd R. Lewis of Atglen, Pa., T. S. Chalfant, the club's regular cashier, E. R. Joslin, ought to be run off smoothly and finished up to the point where the town visitors to be able to make a getaway that will enable them to reach home early in the evening.

100 mark, a fact that speaks for itself as in favor with the popular idea. A few of the DuPont Gun club's lady members took part in the shoot for prizes, and showed good form with their tiny 20 gauge guns. Eleven "pros" shot along in the event "for targets only" so that as there were about 80 prizes pretty nearly every entry carried something back home with him.

A curious feature of the event was that while there were no less than seven 24s and twelve 23s, one perfect score of 25 was made, and that went to the credit of H. Wiley, a member of the Meadow Springs Gun Club, and a resident of Philadelphia. The seven 24s were:—H. P. Carlon, Yungst, W. G. Wood, T. W. Baker, S. Tuchten, D. Dougherty and

James Coyle. The twelve 23s were:—Vincent Oliver, H. E. Buckwalter, A. B. Richardson, J. H. Minnick, A. J. Dando, Clyde Leedom, E. E. DuPont, W. P. Wilson, F. P. Ewing, Griswold, Walter Tomlinson and R. King.

There were seven in the 21s, among them C. H. Newcomb, John Philip Sousa, (who is rapidly making a name for himself at the traps,) T. J. Morris, M. F. Morris, Ike Turner and J. C. Griffith. Colfax was high among the professionals altho chased by Neaf Apgar, breaking 24 and 23 respectively. The full scores will be found later in this report.

It would have been hard to pick out two days of fairer weather for trap-shooting purposes than May 30 and 31, and the club is to be complimented for having, apparently at least, "stood in" with the weather man. So good was the

weather each day, and so smoothly did Charlie North have the Leggett traps working, that the makers of poor scores were hard beset for anything like a fair excuse for the unpopular zeros, two three or frequently more, which would keep turning up most unexpectedly on the score sheets.

Still the big fellows, that is, those who come nearer to breaking 'em all "day in day out," kept on widening the gap between themselves and their less expert brothers at a rate that was little less than astonishing. Among the amateurs George S. McCarty headed the list for the day with a great total of 147 out of 150, including a long run of 109 straight, the longest run of the tournament. Next to him came C. H. Newcomb, also a Philadelphian like Mr. McCarty, and his total was 146. Allen Heil of Allentown, Pa., was third high man for the day on 144, while A. B. Richardson was fourth amateur with 143. Tied with him on the same score was W. S. Colfax, the high professional. J. T. Skelly was second high with 142, H. H. Stevens and Neaf Apgar were tied for third place among the professionals with 141. O. R. Dickey, Friday's high man, landing in fourth place with 140.

For the 300 targets on the two days program, Dickey and Colfax tied for

high average among the professionals; J. T. Skelly and H. H. Stevens tied for second on 280, while Neaf Apgar was third on 278.

The chief honors must however be given to the amateurs who outshot their professional friends by a solid majority. For the two days C. H. Newcomb was high with 289, losing only 11 out of his 300; next to him came G. S. McCarty and Allen Heil with 287; in third place alone was A. B. Richardson, and H. E. Buckwalter with his 284 was in fourth place but tied so far as his individual score went with that of the high professionals.

As the Caldwell trophy, won last year by Harry W. Kahler, goes to the amateur breaking the most targets in the 300 on the regular events for the two days, another Philadelphian, C. H. Newcomb, now holds the trophy until the next shoot. After the contests for the trophy in 1914 and in 1915 has been decided all the winners of the trophy will have a shoot-off at 100 targets per man for final ownership. This will surely

make a shoot-off well worth watching.

The Traffic Department of the DuPont company gave last year a sterling silver cup to be competed for on lines similar to those under which the Caldwell trophy is competed for, with the single exception that the competition for the trophy is open only to amateurs who are resident of the State of Delaware. Alden B. Richardson, of Dover won it in 1912 and duplicated his victory by taking it again this year with 286 out of 300. W. M. Foord was second with 201 and J. H. Minnick second with 280.

HEN is a bird not a bird?

Answer. When it's a "clay pigeon."

Honest, that's a joke, and if you don't believe it's a funny one, you ought to have heard the laugh it brought at Kenilworth park last week. That's the way with all these funny things, when you hear them right off the inspirational bat, as it were, they sound better than they do after they have been transferred to cold, white paper.

A "clay pigeon" is really not a pigeon, you know. It is a round, flat disk-like object that is thrown into the air by means of a spring in a box which is called the "trap." As the "pigeon" sails through the air, the gunners shoot at the flying mark.

A remarkable degree of skill in the trapshooter's sport was evidenced at the 55th annual shoot of the New York State Sportsman's association, when over 150 crack marksmen of the country were entered in the sporting event at Kenilworth park on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of last week.

The fine weather and clear air made ideal conditions for the outdoor event and brought out an animated company, not only of the contestants, but also many of their friends and out of town visitors.

Jay R. Graham, the world's champion, was there with the self same gun with which he secured the first honors for America in the recent clay pigeon shooting contest at the Olympic games at Stockholm. Keen of eye and steady of hand, his expert performance scored high all three days.

Wielding a gun is a rather different matter from wielding a baton, yet trapshooting finds one of its most devoted followers in John Philip Sousa, the famous march king, who was in Buffalo to take part in this sporting event.

The oldest shooter in the pastime, Stephen Fowler, 79 years young, held his own valiantly among professionals and amateurs.

Henry H. Stevens of Roselle Park, N. J., state champion, and Frank S. Wright, for four years holder of the highest amateur honors, and the well-known Seneca Falls squad composed of Dr. Walter W. Vanderhoof, Charles J. Dalley, Winsor J. Norris, David Wadsworth and Cord L. Frantz were among the prominent gunners present.

Other notable marksmen were H. W. Smith, of Syracuse, member of the Onondaga Gun club and past president of the New York State Sportsman's association; Edward Cox of this city, B. V. Covert of Lockport, and Harry Kirkover, of the Audubon club of Buffalo.

Among the professionals were A. H. Durston, H. S. Welles, H. McMurchy, Ed. Banks, J. R. Graham, O. R. Dickey, N. Ahgar, T. H. Keller Jr., S. Glover, H. H. Stevens, Lester German, W. R. Crosby, W. B. Darton, G. Hassam, George Lewis, A. J. Dands.

The office on the grounds was in charge of H. H. Stevens and other officials were G. R. Gwin, cashier; A. T. Shay and H. J. Sweet, scorers.

Tuesday's program consisted of regular events, in which, out of 200

shots, the following scored 190 and over: Jay R. Graham, 196; W. R. Crosby, 194; H. H. Stevens, 191; O. E. Carpenter, 191; J. D. Greene, 190; Lester German, 190.

The "big doings" were listed for Wednesday, the program calling for 150 targets and the Merchandise shoot and a splendid list of prizes was awarded.

The last day, Thursday, saw the contest for the Dean Richmond team trophy, emblematic of the state cham-

ionship for three-men teams, as well as the Greater New York cup event for four-men teams.

Much interest was manifested in the amateur shooting, the championship for which has been held for four years by Frank S. Wright, of South Wales. The amateur championship is determined by the general record of the contestants throughout the entire tournament.

The annual business meeting of the State association was held at the Hotel Iroquois, Tuesday evening and a vote of thanks was extended to the Buffalo Audubon club and to the retiring officers, who were; B. V. Covert, president; Edward Cox, vice-president; and C. F. Lambert, secretary and treasurer.

The meet next year will be held in Rochester and Rochester men were elected officers for the ensuing term. They are Graham Parsons, president; George Appel, vice-president and E. H. Donovan, secretary and treasurer. The association is in a flourishing condition, having a large membership and adequate funds.

Handsome prizes and trophies were awarded to the winners of the different events on the program.

Country's Best Marksmen Flock to Dayton; Many Engage in Practice for Big Shoot

With dozens of the best marksmen of the country early in the field, the practice shoot, preliminary to the great American handicap drew a large assemblage to the N. C. R. gun club grounds Monday. One hundred and seventy-five participated Monday, clearing their bearings for the events to follow.

On Tuesday morning, beginning at 9 o'clock sharp, the American professional and the amateur championship will be shot for, on 200 birds.

The event of great importance will be the American handicap shoot of Thursday. It is imperative that all entries be in by Tuesday afternoon at 5 o'clock.

Notable shooters and marksmen are in the city in large numbers for the event, many registrations filling the pages of the Algonquin, Phillips, Beckel and Atlas hotels.

The list of entries crawled close to

the 500 mark Monday. In the practice shoot Monday there were 5 events of 20 birds each in the morning and afternoon. On Tuesday the amateur and professional championship will draw heavily. Each division will work from an 18 foot line and shoot at 200 targets. Wednesday the preliminary handicap is to be held with 5 events and 100 targets and on Thursday the Great American Handicap proper will take place. There are 5 events of 100 targets each and the participants are handicapped according to their ability. On Friday a Consolation handicap will be shot and those eligible will be only those who failed to win prize money in the other event. A strong feature of Friday's program will be amateur and professional championship shooting of doubles. Each shooter is to fire at 50 targets

and will endeavor to break two birds consecutively with the usual rest.

NOTABLES ARE HERE.

Among the notables here for the event are James E. Skelly, president of the national organization; Frank J. Drew, New Haven, Conn., vice president of the national body; Wilmer E. Shanor, of Pittsburgh, the treasurer, and his son, E. Reed Shanor, who is secretary of the national trap shooting body. John Phillip Sousa, bandmaster, is also here to shoot. Lester German, former New York national pitcher and representative of the Dupont Powder company, and Luther Squier, who originated the "Squier money-back system," widely known to the trap shooting fraternity, are among the other prominent shots who will grace the occasion.

DEAN OF FIELD LOSES OUT TO YOUNGER RIVAL

Large Gallery Watches Ex-
perts Break Clay Birds
at Gun Club.

HIGH MARKS ARE
MADE IN TESTS

J. M. Markham, of N. C. R.
Makes Fine Showing in
Amateur Class.

When the last squad had ceased firing in the preliminary handicap that was held at the N. C. R. traps Wednesday under the auspices of the Interstate association, Captain Andy Meaders, the 73-year-old marksman from Nashville, and Alden R. Richardson, son of United States Senator Richardson, from Delaware, were tied for first place in the event, each having a score of 96 out of a possible 100.

To decide the winner there was nothing to do but hold a shoot-off and this was done. J. T. Skelly, president of the Interstate association, acted as scorer for the two shooters, while E. H. Weinans, of the Western Cartridge company, worked the trap and Elmer E. Shaner, treasurer of the association, filled the capacity of referee.

SHOOT OFF TIE.

There was a large gallery watching the two contestants shoot it out for the honor and the greater majority of them were pulling for "Cap" Meaders to win, no doubt because he was many years senior of his younger rival.

The marksmen shot at 20 targets and the one breaking the most was to be the winner. Both got away on even terms, each breaking their first six "birds." Then Richardson missed his seventh target and Meaders did likewise. Each broke the next fourth in quick succession, but Meaders missed his twelfth target and Richardson got his, giving him the lead.

Richardson, however, dropped his fourteenth "bird," evening up the score and it remained that way until Meaders missed his seventeenth target,



which put Richardson to the fore and there he remained until the finish, as Andy also dropped his eighteenth target, giving him a total of 16 out of 20, while Richardson got 18.

GETS TROPHY.

By winning the preliminary handicap, Richardson won the first prize given in this event of \$156 and a trophy offered by the Interstate association. He is one of the best known trap shooters in the east and holds the amateur state championship of Delaware.

In Wednesday's event, Richardson shot from the twenty-yard line, while Meaders pulled the trigger on his gun from the eighteen yard mark.

Andy Meaders had a score of 78 when he went to the firing line in his

fifth event, and if he had broken 19 of his 20 targets there would have been no necessity of having a shoot-off, but the veteran could not accomplish this and missed two "birds" which gave him a total score of 96.

HAS FINE SCORE.

Richardson has been shooting in fine form all along and Monday he tied for second place in the amateur championship event with a score of 193 out of a possible 200.

Only the amateur shooters were

eligible to win the preliminary handicap, but quite a few professional shooters shot through the program. Each marksman shot from the handicap allotted him for the Grand American which will start today.

Walter Huff of Macon, Ga., was high professional Wednesday. He broke 96 "birds," losing but four out of the hundred.

Other high scores made among the professionals were W. R. Chamberlin of Columbus, Ohio, 95; M. G. Taylor of Meckling, South Dakota, 95; E. W. Clancy of Chicago, Ill., 95; H. C. Kirkwood of La Grange, Ill., 95, and E. N. Daniel, 95.

FOUR ARE CLOSE.

There were four shooters in the amateur class who finished but one point behind the scores made by Meaders and Richardson. F. M. Edwards of Columbus, Ohio, Joe Barto of Chicago, Ill., W. V. Jackson of Ingleside, Ill., and C. A. Galbraith of Bay City, Mich., were the marksmen referred to and each turned in a score of 95. Barto and Jackson shot from the 20-yard line and Galbraith and Edwards from the 19-yard mark.

D. M. Young of Butler, Pa., J. J. Frink of Worthington, Minn., George Kistler of Celina, Ohio, and C. McQuaid had an excellent chance to win, but for one bad event when he lost three "birds" and this put him out of the running.

DAYTON SHOOTERS.

Among the Dayton shooters who turned in a score of 90 or better in the amateur class was J. M. Markham of the N. C. R. Gun club, who made a mark of 93. One event of 16 "birds" spoiled his chances of being figured in with the first money.

ney, Where Big Scores Are Made.



Lewis Amateur Champion; Young Wins Professional

The opening of the Grand American Handicap at the N. C. R. Gun club Tuesday marked a new epoch in the history of the club as not only were the scores the highest that have ever been made in the entire history of the association, taking all the results into consideration, but the manner in which the meet was handled locally, outclassed anything ever before attempted in the history of shooting events in this country.

The winning of the national amateur championship by Bart Lewis of Auburn, Ill., Tuesday, was a well deserved honor, and is the result of the consistent work that has always characterized the shooting of this most popular member of the association. The score of 195 as made by Lewis, is close behind that of Charles F. Young of Springfield, O., who won the professional title with the magnificent score of 197 targets out of the possible 200.

The result of the professional contest was also a most popular one and was predicted by the wise ones around the score board early in the day when Young's form began to show itself.

The trophies won in the professional event was \$110.40 and a medal valued at \$50, the amateur trophies won by Lewis, \$271.20, and a diamond studded trophy valued at \$100.

In the professional events W. H. Heer was second with a score of 194, and in the amateur contest A. B. Richardson was second with a score of 193.

E. HILLYER, JR., WINS IN SHOOT

Band Master Sousa Is a Bit
Off in Day's Gun-
ning

MORE SPORT TODAY

John Phillip Sousa, the bandmaster and march king, and an enthusiastic sportsman, was a big attraction at the two day registered shoot here yesterday. Sousa had an off day and of the 150 clay targets he brought down 117.

Some exceedingly good scores were made by both amateurs and professionals. "Billy" Herr, of Guthrie, Oklahoma, a professional, had the best score of the day with a total of 149. He missed one target in the seventh frame. The days shoot was won by E. Hellyer, Jr., of Bradford, with a score of 147, amateur class. Second honors were divided between A. J. Mengle, Reading; A. Hell, Allentown; Adams and Beun, Reading all having a score of 144 out of a possible 150. Lockwood B. Worden, Harrisburg took third place with a mark of 143.

The shoot will be continue today. The following prominent Harrisburg shots took an active part in the shoot and made some good marks as the final scores show: Shoop, Martin, Hoffman, Fred Dinger, George Hoffman, Karl Stewart, W. G. Hepler, L. B. Worden, Jack Wise, Marysville, Wilson and Seidel.

The success of the shoot lay largely in the excellent condition of the field traps and equipment which was installed and cared for under the direction of Curtis R. Fisher and Harry L. Lutz, of the Harrisburg Association. These two men worked hard for the shoot and had everything in excellent condition.

Sousa had the following to say: "I have not been able to shoot so well since I came North. I did fairly well in the South, but I must be going stale or something. I was troubled today by getting something in my eye." He was not using the \$1,000 gun in the shoot yesterday. He said he was trying out a new gun, which was comparatively cheap. "It cost me \$200," he said. "I had it especially made. It is a longer barrel than my \$1,000 gun. That one has a 32 inch barrel, while this new one is 32 inches in length."

He will attend a number of shoots this month, before he starts his band concert season on August 5. From this city he goes to Sandusky for four days. On July 11 he will shoot at the Baltimore Country Club, and the following day will attend the Philadelphia League shoot at Holmesburg Junction. He will attend the Eastern Handicap shoot at Wilmington from July 14 to 17 and during the next week he will be at a shoot in Ocean City, Md. Then, as he said last night, he will "lay his guns away in the moth balls" until the following April and start out with his band on August 5. He plans to open in Ocean Grove, New Jersey.







SPECIAL REPORT.

A most successful tournament was brought to a close on July 10th at Cedar Point, Ohio. The fourteenth annual of the Okoboji Tribe of Indians, beginning on July 8, with the afternoon of July 7 for practice events. The weather throughout the week was fine, with the exception of a slight shower on Tuesday morning. The heat was severe at times, but, as always, there was a cooling breeze from the lake which made the heat endurable.

PRACTICE DAY.

Sixty-two shooters were on hand for practice day, July 7, and shot through the nine events, 150 targets, of the program. The day was pleasant, with a light breeze. John Philip Sousa (Chief March King) was on the firing line, and out of the first 70 targets missed but two. G. E. Painter and J. W. Ball tied for high amateur score on 145. R. B. Guy was second, with 144. C. D. Coburn and J. N. Knox were tie for third, with 143 each.

R. O. Heikes was the star of the afternoon, leading the bunch with 149, and a run of over 135. He reached the grounds a little late, shooting in the second event and finishing in the first event, in which he missed his lone target. G. W. Maxwell was second, with 146, and W. R. Graham were third, with 144 each. The Squier money-back was settled each day, so that shooters did not have to take part both days unless they wished. On Tuesday there was \$268.70 surplus to be divided among the eighteen high amateurs. J. B. Barto finished a run started on practice day, making a total of 111 and thereby winning a du Pont long run trophy.

He told of "Chief Bald Eagle's" (R. O. Heikes) never equaled record of 100 buffalos killed straight with bow and arrows, and of having, when a mere lad in knickerbockers, often paid \$1.00 to see "Chief Sparrow" (C. A. Young) shoot individual matches. A short sketch of the tribe, its origin and objects, was also given. The warriors and squaws then hit the trail for the dining wigwam, where the annual "Dog Feast" was enjoyed by all, after which a visit was made to the dancing pavilion, and then the braves sought their tepees for a much-needed rest.

THIRD DAY.

The last day, July 10, was partly cloudy, and a strong northwest wind made hard targets. Very few shooters had left, the number facing the traps being 107. The program was the same as on Tuesday—two 25-target specials, entrance 50 cents, an optional \$2.00 sweep in each, and ten 15-target events, entrance \$10.00, under the Squier money-back system. The start was made promptly at nine o'clock and the program finished at five in the afternoon. Every one left the grounds quickly for a last dip in the lake.

A much regretted incident of the shoot was the absence of High Chief Johnston ("All Aboard") and his wife, who were detained by illness in the family.

Bart Lewis won another long-run bar with 107. Other runs were: J. R. Johnson, 86; G. W. Maxwell, 73.

The amateur high average cup was won by C. D. Coburn on 146. Bart Lewis, who tied with him, was not eligible, having won a similar cup on the first day.

High professionals for the day were: W. R. Crosby, 148; J. R. Graham, 146; G. W. Maxwell and R. W. Clancy, 145 each. G. W. Maxwell made a run of 174, finishing today with his first two targets. C. D. Coburn was second high man in the 450 targets of the regular and special events, breaking 433; F. C. Kolb, 430; J. N. Knox, 429, and M. S. Hootman (the winner of the Grand American), 425.

On July 9 an error was made in the score of E. O. Lothamer. In the second round of the Indian Handicap he broke 24 instead of 20, making his total 82 instead of 78, and landing him in the money in Class C, instead of Class D.

GIBBS AND LEWIS LEAD BIG FIELDS

**Tennessee Professional With 149 Breaks,
and Illinois Amateur's 145, Best Scores
in White's All-Day Tournament**

A field of thirty amateurs and ten professionals rubbed shoulders and fingered triggers in the sixth annual target tournament of the S. S. White's Gun Club shot over the Holmesburg Junction traps yesterday, but with the exception of a very few the majority finished with scores far below the ordinary. There was no chance for the gunners who failed to be up "thar" to furnish alibis for their mediocre work, for the day was clear, old Boreas was as meek as a spring lamb, the traps worked splendidly and the field was never allowed to stray into dilatory ways. But there was something lacking in the art of smashing the clays for most of the gunmen, although the shoot proved to be a hotly contested one, in which many ties, especially in the S. S. White's Handicap event, rendered the flip of a coin necessary to decide the many trophies.

H. D. Gibbs, of the Union City, Tennessee, professional, led the entire contingent of both expert and amateur sharpshooters. Out of his 150 targets, the principal card of the day, the Southerner smashed 149, breaking straight in every event but the fifth, when he lost his lone flyer.

To Bart Lewis, of Arbor, Illinois, one of the best amateur shots of the Middle West, fell the high gun honor for the Simon Pures. Lewis fired at his 150 with an ease and abandon that brought forth admiration and envy from the field. Out of his quota of a century and a half skimmers he shattered 145, running straight in seven of his ten events, losing two in his first and ninth rounds and one on his fourth stand. Lewis called for and shattered his clays with an nonchalance that was as surprising as it was praiseworthy. Very few gunners, either professionals or amateurs, who have shot here have ever shown the apparent accurate carelessness in shooting as Lewis exhibited yesterday. He no sooner called for his bird than it was dusted to smithereens, there hardly being a wait for an eyelash between the call and the shot. Lewis also participated in the 50-bird White Handicap, in which he totaled 48.

H. P. Wilson, a Frankford shot, finished runner-up to Lewis with 143, with Charles H. Newcomb, of this city, and F. W. Matthews, of Trenton, on a par for third with 139 each.

Many famous shots contested in the event, one of the most notable being Fred Gilbert, of Spirit Lake, Iowa, the Grand Old Man of the shooting world. Gilbert did not accomplish anything extraordinary with his gun, breaking 140 of his 150, but he did not extend himself to do so. John Phillip Sousa, the noted bandmaster, who is a particularly keen devotee of the trap shooting game, fired through the entire card, smashing 126 of his 150 and 42 of his 50 in the handicap test.

In the half century of clays for the S. S. White's handicap race four spoons were donated for the high and runner up on each 25 and a silver trophy for the grand total for the card. The high total resulted in a tie between Abbott, of this city, and R. H. Bruns, of Brookville, Ind., with the highest possible score of 50 each. Both reached that mark through their handicap, although Bruns broke more clays than did Ab-

bott, he getting 49 to the latter's 44. On the shoot-off at 25 to decide the deadlock the contestants tied at 25-all. Bruns running straight and Abbott breaking 21, but his handicap of four placed him even with his competitor. They then decided to settle the question with a toss of a coin and Abbott proved to be the better guesser. Abbott also won one of the spoons donated for the first event, while Waters grabbed two and the other went to Pennington.

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95 BREAKS WINS TROPHY FOR FOORD

Local Shooter High in Match Emblematic of 18 Yard Championship

Shooting in a late squad of professionals, after most of the other amateurs had finished, and A. B. Richardson, former State champion, had hung up a score of 94 and was conceded the handsome duPont 18-yard mark championship trophy, W. M. Foord, a local shooter, smashed 95 targets out of 100, and won the trophy emblematic of the 18-yard championship of the United States and the large purse that went with it.

Mr. Foord was in rare form today and broke his targets with the ease that only a champion can display. His victory is all the greater when one considers that at every bird he was looking in the face of the remarkable score of A. B. Richardson, who was conceded the trophy until Mr. Foord's scores commenced to come. He went through his first 40 birds losing only two. It was here that he began to get dangerous. In his next 20 he dropped two, making the race exceedingly close and in the next lost one more bird. When he started on the last string he knew that he would have to go straight to win and he could only afford to lose one if he was going to tie Mr. Richardson. His trap was the center of all eyes and the large crowd counted the targets one by one as Foord broke them with his quick snappy shooting, never hesitating at a single bird. Finally he came to his nineteenth. The crowd held its breath until Foord broke it into dust. To smash the next one meant the honors and one of the handsomest trophies in competition: to miss it was to tie.

The shooter looked back at the crowd with a confident smile, placed his gun to his shoulder carefully and "Pull"—"Bang", a target gracefully shot out from the trap and in an instant was transformed into a cloud of dust. The trophy had been won only by the hardest kind of shooting by a local man who had not only out shot his amateur rivals but had routed the professionals.

The crowd applauded the shooter for several minutes and many rushed to congratulate him on his victory. Among the first ones to grasp his hand was the vanquished sportsman, A. B. Richardson, the hero of many a contest and regarded as one of the best shooters in the country.

C. F. Moore and J. M. Hawkins, both professionals, tied Mr. Richardson's score. J. B. McHugh, a local shooter, made an excellent showing, getting 90 out of his 100. J. H. Minnick, another local man and holder of the world's record for 500 birds, was off form today, and could only get 81 out of his 100.

When the shooting began the eyes of the crowd were turned on J. Phillip Sousa, the march king, who is also a member of the trapshooting nobility. Attired in a natty grey suit and white shoes, he presided over the traps with the same ease as if he were leading his famous band. Mr. Sousa did not feel in shooting trim this morning and consequently got only 72 of the targets. He is a regular 90 per cent man and no doubt will be back at his old form before the Eastern Handicap ends.

Another man who attracted much attention today was George Maxwell, the one-armed shooter. He got 88. The shooter has only one arm, but he handles his gun quickly and was one of the surest shooters at the traps this morning.

Mrs. Ad Topperwein, the champion woman shot of the world, gave a splendid exhibition of what a woman can do with a gun by getting 91 out of a hundred. On Friday, at Baltimore, she beat all men with a score of 97.

Among the other shooters who made good scores today were Edward Banks, champion of Delaware, 83; S. W. Putman, 91; B. Lewis, 93; R. H. Burns, 90, and G. L. Lyon, 92.

This afternoon will be practice for the shooters and all of them will probably shoot over the traps to get the lay of the land and become used to the back ground.

Dinner was served to the gunners today on the grounds in a huge tent that had been erected by the club. Several other tents have been erected for the convenience of the shooters and the crowds that will throng the club from tomorrow until the crack of the last gun. Among the tents is a large rest tent with a capacity of several hundred people. Dinner will be served on the grounds each day.

The "pro" dropped but one target out of his 150. H. J. Gibbs, of Union City, Tenn., finished second, with 148. He is also a professional.

Charles H. Newcomb, Philadelphia, and R. H. Bruns, Brooksville, Ind., tied for high honors among the amateurs, each "grassing" 146. The Atlantic City cup was set up for today, and the even totals necessitated a shoot-off. This extra string was won by Bruns, who broke 25 in a row. Newcomb dropped one. The Indiana amateur now holds the seashore cup until next year, since it must be won three times before permanent ownership is given. He was also awarded a gold purse through his performance. E. H. Storr, a professional from Richmond, likewise totaled a card of 146.

Al Heil, of Allentown, and Frank B. Stephenson, Brooklyn, were next in line among amateurs, scoring 145 out of their century and a half of blue rocks.

J. Mowell Hawkins, of Baltimore, won the "high-run" purse. He went through a row of 143 without a miss.

W. S. Behm, an amateur from Reading, and Homer Clark, an expert from Alton, Ill., won the specially-arranged match at doubles in their respective class. Each took down 19 out of their 10 pair.

Asbury Park may supplant Atlantic City as the shooting grounds of the Westy Hogans. The invitation of the sister resort was favorably received at the annual meeting. Shooters are in a way disappointed because the tourney this year was not on the pier, and it is said that the transfer will be made unless Atlantic City places an ocean field at the disposal of the visitors.

TRAPSHOOTER SPOTTS OWNS RICHARDS' CUP

**Wins His Third Leg On Prize
From Forty-nine Gunners
at Larchmont.**

SHOOTING AT BENSONHURST.

**Few Clubs Hold Events in Honor of
Washington's Birthday—Win-
ners at Bayside.**

It is getting to be an old, old story with R. L. Spotts. Once more, the clever Larchmont gunner has captured an important prize. From a field of forty-nine marksmen, Spotts took the club and university shoot over the traps of the Larchmont Yacht Club yesterday. It was his third win on the prize, so now he is the permanent owners of the \$1,000 cup originally presented by Commodore Leonard Richards five years ago.

Heretofore the shoot has been held during April. The traps of the Bergen Beach Gun Club also were closed.

Many of the Brooklyn gunners were at Larchmont. The best work was done by J. Frank James, chairman of the shooting committee of the Marine and Field Club. He finished third, two "birds" behind the winner. Spotts had a total of 175 out of 200 targets. Then came G. H. Piercy, a Jersey gunner, with 174, and J. F. James with a total of 173 targets. Frank B. Stephenson, another Crescent gunner, finished fourth.

Detroit Woman Is Not Only World's Champion Lady Shot; Also Manages a Big Brewery



A world championship holder and one of the best known all-round sportswomen is Mrs. Lewis C. Vogel, of Detroit. A woman of independent means, and therefore free to pursue her expensive hobby, she holds the world championship for live bird shooting, the ladies' indoor championship of America for clay pigeon shooting, recently won at Madison Square Garden, New York. She recently returned from New York, where she shot at the Travel and Sportsman's show on the roof of the Grand Central Palace. This was the beginning of roof shooting for women at a sportsman's show. Mrs. Vogel is a fine athlete. She was one of the first women in the east to ride astride. She has owned a good stable and run her own horses over the southern racing circuits. She has handled a gun ever since she was a child, and she has shot pretty much all over this country and in Europe.

"I was simply born to it," said Mrs. Vogel. "My father was a fine shot, and a good sportsman, and my brothers and I are living up to our rights. From the time I was a little girl I went out shooting with them at the traps and on long hunting trips, all around our home in Lancaster, Pa., and I seldom missed a good fox chase. If it came to a choice between dancing and shooting I never let the shooting get by. I was one of the very first women in the east to ride astride, and I was horribly criticized, but now, of course, everybody is riding that way. I have traveled a great deal with my father and we had splendid times shooting on some of the finest preserves in

Europe. I love it around Baden Baden, at Munich, and down around Monte Carlo. I have shot deer in Europe, too, but sport, strictly speaking, is a good deal of a joke over there. The land and the game are so carefully guarded that when there is a hunt on it seems as if the animals were just sent out to stand and wait for somebody to come along and kill them. I like shooting quail in Virginia and North Carolina, and I have never missed a West Hogan shoot. It is one of the biggest shoots in the country, and we go to Atlantic City for it. We had a lot of good sport off from Young's pier before it burned, and shooting is good at the Country Club there.

"My dogs? I have 11 splendid ones—my old home, pointers and setters. The dogs are almost the best part of hunting. It is wonderful to see them. My favorites are pointers and welsh setters.

"And, by the way, it is not generally known that people with light eyes are the best shots. A lot of people with dark eyes have become the shots, but light eyes are the truest. Shooting at the traps is an all-year-round sport, and clean in every sense of the word. Life in the open cannot be too strongly advocated from a physical and moral standpoint. I have hunted deer and been quite successful, having several of the heads mounted. Field shooting, especially quail hunting with good dogs is thrilling. There is nothing more fascinating. It is great to be out in the air and the open, using quick judgment back of a sure eye. And the health it gives, tramping around carrying your gun! Think of the wonderful nights

of camping and going through anything for your game.

"Yes, there is a shooting club here. The Pastime Gun club has bought ground out Michigan avenue and is building a \$5,000 club house which will be one of the finest in the state. It will be ready for use this summer, and the Michigan state shoot will be held there July 21 to 24. I am very much interested in trying to get them to take up moonlight shooting. If I succeed, Detroit will be the first American city outside of New York to do it. It is beautiful and fascinating. The target is dipped in whitewash and shows up splendidly."

John Philip Sousa, the famous bandmaster, who is a fine shot himself, is a particular friend of Mrs. Vogel's. They have shot at many of the same meets and are very enthusiastic about each other. Mrs. Vogel belongs to so many gun clubs and shooting clubs and goes to so many meets that she can't remember all of them. She is a good linguist and speaks French and German as well as she does English. Her father came to America from Germany, and with all the rest that Mrs. Vogel does, she keeps a strong governing hand on the big brewery industry that he established and left to his heirs, so that as well as ranking as a fine sportswoman she has the very unusual interest, for a woman, of managing her own brewery and keeping close watch of all of the details of her business.

Great Sport For Trapshooters

Most Successful Season in the History of the Game Will Reach
Climax with National Championships at Travers Island,
April 24-25.

TRAP shooting, though sanctioned by the Club for many years, may well be said to be in its infancy. This peculiar state of affairs may best be understood by a consideration of the origin of the game. Trap shooting, as first introduced, was merely a substitute for the then popular pastime of live-bird shooting, and, as was only natural, the original shooters in the Club were mustered from the ranks of the live-bird shots. Their favorite pastime being prohibited by law, they were only too willing to accept a substitute. But in these

later days the new shooter, not having experienced the thrill of the live-bird shoot, is attracted to the game rather for its own sake than because it is a substitute. And, therefore, we find that after some years of what may well be termed stagnation, the sport of trap shooting is rushing into popularity by leaps and bounds.


Realizing this wonderfully increasing popularity, the Governors of the Club decided that the trap shooting game should be put on a basis that would appeal to all. This happened at the start of the season, back in September. And now in only six months' time the great wisdom of their move is more than apparent. For, with the reduced cost of shooting, the attendance at the weekly shoots has almost doubled. And each Saturday brings its new recruit.

Then, also, the improvement is shown in the competitive line. The boys, realizing that the Club is taking an interest in their game, have started out to clean up all comers in both individual and team shooting. With this object in view, several team races have been arranged and many of the fellows have entered in the big shoots around the country. Of course the winnings will improve with time but as a start the following events have been put in the game sack:

On January 3d a team composed of Billings, Spotts, Corbett, Culver and McMahon journeyed to Lakewood and captured the Laurel House Cup, emblematic of the team championship of the Jersey coast.

On January 17th, at the Manhasset Bay Yacht Club, D. F. McMahon finished second in the championship of Long Island Sound, and the Athletic Club team composed of McMahon, Spotts, Culver, Corbett and Thomson succeeded in winning the team championship.

the Mid-Winter Handicap at Pinehurst, N. C. At this tournament were gathered most of the cracks from the South and West, but the N. Y. A. C. boys managed to work in on some of the trophies. D. F. McMahon finished second in the sixteen-yard shooting on the second day, had the third high score in the Pinehurst Handicap and was second in the race for the President's Cup. A. Elliott Ranney was third in the preliminary and Dr. D. L. Culver was second in the Pinehurst Handicap.

The Marine and Field Club of Brooklyn having finished second to the N. Y. A. C. in several of the team races, a special match was arranged between the two clubs and the first leg, shot at the M. & F. grounds on February second, resulted in a victory for our boys by forty birds. The match was to have been

NEWCOMB WINS EVERYTHING IN SIGHT IN HOLMESBURG SHOOT

Breaking 97 out of his 100 birds, which captured the Pennsylvania State Championship, smashing 47 out of 50 and tying Al Heil, of Allentown, and John Philip Sousa, the noted bandmaster, for the first half of the Keystone Handicap event and gathering 171 out of his total of 175 targets, was the wonderful record made by Charles H. Newcomb, one of the best target shots in the country, in the first day of the two day blue rock event of the Keystone Shooting League's tournament, held at Holmesburg Junction yesterday. Newcomb was the commanding figure of the day. He gave a wonderful exhibition of blue rock smashing from his first lifeless bird to his last. But he had to shoot at this phenomenal gait for the field of gunmen who entered the day's best included the cream of New Jersey, Delaware, New York and Pennsylvania and they were shooting with a sharpshooter's precision during the day.

The shoot for the Pennsylvania State championship was keen all the way and was in doubt until the last shot had been turned in at the office. Newcomb and Hellyer ran a close race, the former just nosing out the latter by one target. With the State championship went the duPont amateur challenge trophy. The holder is subject to challenge by any amateur who is a citizen of Pennsylvania.

Ralph L. Spotts, of the New York Athletic Club, finished a good second in the 175 target race, being only two targets behind Newcomb, with Heil, of Allentown; E. V. Hellyer, of Doylestown, tied up for third amateur with 167. The high professional honors went to Lester S. German, of Aberdeen, Md., who tied Newcomb's total of 171, while J. Mal Hawkins was second. As showing the speed of the shooters, German ran 108 targets before he missed, W. A. Brown broke 78 consecutive birds, Newcomb, 69; Hellyer, 68; and Heil, 61. Other particularly noteworthy performances were Vincent Oliver, with 164; John Sousa with 163, and Powers with a similar total.

The Delaware gunners were not in the running. Scores of the men in the 175 target event were: Richardson, 165; Foard, 164; Hammond, 156; McHugh, 150. In the Keystone handicap the Delaware boys hung up the following scores: Richardson, 44; Foard, 20; Hammond, 43; McHugh, 40.

TRAP SHOOTING IS DEMOCRATIC SPORT

Business Man and Clerk, High
and Lowly Alike, May Shoot
Clay Pigeons.

WAS BORN IN UNITED STATES

Unlike Other American Game, Base-
ball, Fans All Take Part in
Contests.

Golf may boast of its Scotch origin,
polo trace its line from England to
India, and cricket pride itself on Brit-
ish birth, but shooting at "clay pig-
eons" or clay targets is distinctly
American-born.

Pass by the alien sports we have
adopted with pleasure and benefit, and
compare trap shooting with the dis-
tinctive American game of baseball.

Ball Fan Can Only Yell.

The baseball fan goes to the ball
grounds, sits in the stand and watches
his favorite team reach a heart-break-
ing crisis in the game, but much as
he may wish to share the glory and
the thrill of the contest, his part is
limited to cheering his side on to vic-
tory, or sitting helpless while it goes
down to defeat. His sole participation
in the sport is mental. But not so
with the trap shooter; he is the
"player," and it is his to know all the
zest of competition. To follow his
hobby does not require neglect of af-
fairs of life, for trap shooting may be
indulged in as little or as much as
circumstances allow.

Independent of Weather.

The "open" season for trap shoot-
ing is all of the calendar months, and
it may be enjoyed regardless of weath-
er conditions. Any large field is a
hunting ground with game a-plenty,
for the clay "birds" fly every day.

Trap shooting knows no caste, and
refuses to recognize social distinction
—it accepts a man as a man. His suc-
cess or failure at the sport is entire-
ly in his own hands. The game ap-
peals to all ages and conditions of
men, and is one of the few sports in
which both sexes meet on equal terms.

Not Expensive Sport.

Look at a squad of shooters and you
will perhaps recognize the most emi-
nent member of the bar standing be-
side a clerk whose income precludes
membership in a country club. His
neighbor is a successful manufacturer,
whose fondness for the gun has never
waned, but who no longer can stand
the exposure of days afield; the next
man is a physician whose profession-
al duties permit but a short period of
relaxation, so he has driven his car
to the club grounds for an hour or two
at the traps; the fifth shooter is a
woman who loves the great out-of-
doors and its pastimes.

Some St. Paul Shooters.

In St. Paul such prominent men as
Dr. L. M. Benepe, Dr. F. J. Pionke,
Louis Betz, George G. Benz, William
Hamm, Herbert P. Keller, Dr. Howard
Lanckster, George H. MacRea are
members of the St. Paul Rod and Gun
club.

Attracts Ball Players.

That trap shooting has elements
which attract men who breathe and
live sport is evident by its naming
among its enthusiastic followers such
nationally known men as Honus Wag-
ner of the Pittsburgh National league
team, Big Chief Bender, the Indian
twirler of the world's championship
Athletics; Lester German, who for-
sook the New York Nationals to be-
come a professional "player" in the
"sport alluring," and many other base-
ball celebrities. On the other hand, we
see John Philip Sousa finding invig-
orating recreation in making dust of
the furtive "clay pigeon."

To the man or woman possessed of
a tender heart, and who has no pleas-
ure in the destruction of living crea-
tures, trap shooting affords pleasure
without regret.

As a sport for women trap shooting

rapidly is growing in popularity. Hun-
dreds of women are taking up the
pastime, and in many cases are prov-
ing themselves formidable competitors
for high honors. Mrs. R. R. Barber
often has as good scores as the best
of the amateurs.

Cleveland (Ohio) Gun Club.

The long disputed question of trap shooting supremacy in
Cleveland is going to be determined this year beyond all
possibility of doubt. There's something real doing.

Due to the thoughtfulness and generosity of E. S. Rogers,
former president of the Cleveland Gun Club, the local gunners
have been enabled to go about their task of deciding the title
in a systematic fashion. The most attractive feature of the
contest is the reward, a magnificent diamond studded gold medal.

The trophy is undoubtedly
the most valuable ever competed
for by members of the Cleve-
land Gun Club. It was designed
by a New York firm from
ideas suggested by Mr. Rogers.
The border consists of a laurel
wreath with two shotguns in
relief extending across the face
of the fob. In the center is
the reproduction of a clay tar-
get embellished with a half
carat diamond. "Champion

If ties exist for this trophy, the same are to be shot off on
the last Saturday afternoon in December, 1914, 100 targets, 16
yards rise, high gun to win.

German of New York City, were tied for second honors among the professionals with 117.

G. N. Fish of Lyndonville showed the way to the amateurs in the eight events with a total of 117. G. A. Brown was second with 115, while J. D. Green of Avon and W. W. Vanderhoof of New York were tied with 114.

The feature event of the day, the merchandise event of fifty birds, was open to amateurs only. J. S. Hopkins proved to be the winner of the first prize, \$100 in gold. He made a perfect score of 50. E. Goodwin broke each bird through 49, but, with the crowd squeezing with him, he fell down on his last shot and had to share second honors with M. E. Barker.

Trick Shooter Entertains.

Rush Razee of the Remington U. M. C. Company entertained the crowd with a number of trick shots with rifle and revolver. In one he shot a hole through a cake of soap held by an individual of undoubted nerve, using a steel nose bullet. He then shot at another cake of soap, using a "mushroom" bullet, with the result that said cake was scattered about the adjoining surf.

GUNNERS IN STATE SHOOT LED BY ILLINOIS PRO IN OPENING EVENTS AT LAKE

Homer Clark Breaks 159 of 160 for Most
Remarkable Record of Day---H. Harrison
of Brilliant Aim in Doubles.

NEW YORK AND ROCHESTER WOMEN DRAW NOTICE BY THEIR TALENT

Leaders in State Shoot

Leaders in main contest, eight events of twenty targets each—Amateur, F. S. Wright, of South Wales, N. Y., 155, and A. C. Skutt, of Morton, in tie at 155; professional, Homer Clark, of Alton, Ill., with 159.

Leaders in state championship, fifty targets, remaining fifty to be shot to-morrow—Amateur, F. S. Wright, South Wales, 49; professional, W. M. Hammond, Wilmington, Del., 50.

A gunman who is in good standing with the law, walked out at Ontario Beach yesterday morning to a pine stake a few yards from where the lake was spilling a white feather of foam on the shore. He uttered one word, a lever was pulled, a blue rock took wing from its green cote, a gun sputtered and the ruined bird fell into the water.

It was the start of an exhilarating opening day of the New York State Sportsman's Association's annual shoot, which has recurred so often that the promoters have to look over the files to agree on what number to print before "Annual Shoot." Appearing on this year's cover is "56th."

The person who began the racket that endured until twilight, said "Pull," come to find out from reliable sources, when he stepped before the traps. One at first charged it on the fierce acoustics, but after listening to a chorus of grunts and squeals and howls—they all meant "Pull"—you became aware that the marksman has a language just as intelligible at times as the nasal bolee of the Japs who keep the odds-and-ends casino hard by the Venetian canal, or the reading of the roll by the City Clerk.

Fine Life for Blue Rocks.

"Pull" means the same as "Play Ball" or the orchestra overture or "Go" to the man in the sulky. It isn't much of a chance that the clay puppet has. Either it goes down to the lakewood or it is blown to bits by the shot, so the baseball has a happy little life compared to the blue rock.

As soon as one squad went down the line yesterday and popped away at the flying targets as they were sped aloft in devious courses, its stand was taken by another section and there wasn't an intermission from 9 until dusk.

The over-all champion of the day was W. M. Hammond, of Wilmington, Del., whose talented aim sent the leaden pills against the birds for a string of fifty straight hits in his half-hundred tries. Some extraordinary shooting was seen before all the traps for that matter.

Kills 159 of 160 Birds.

Homer Clark, a professional of Alton, Ill., killed 159 birds of a possible 160—a single miss—all being shot from a sixteen-foot rise. Harry Harrison heard the announcer cry "dead and dead" twelve times in the doubles before he was credited with a lost, or missed, bird.

In the doubles the birds are sprung in pairs, flying at an acute angle, and in the few seconds elapsing from the time that they soar into the air till they slash the water the gunner must train his double-barreled iron first on one and then on the other. At this style the Rochester man was high of the day with 44 of 50, and his first miss was on his twenty-fifth shot.

F. S. Wright, of South Wales, and A. C. Skutt, of Morton, each with 155 in 160, topped the amateurs. The leaders were in this order:

The Interstate Association's amateur state championship of 100 targets was half completed yesterday. The remaining fifty birds will be shot to-morrow. F. S. Wright led in the first flight yesterday with but one bird lost in his fifty shots, but his future is beset by perils that a round dozen shooters hope to provide. Three are tied at 48, while eight stand at 47, as follows:

Thinks System Is Wrong.

The winner of the Grand American Handicap at Springfield, Ill., in 1912, W. E. Phillips, of Chicago, did not get

away in his first event until along in the late afternoon and the hovering night evidently blurred his vision. He faced eighty birds of the 160 programed for the first day and had nine misses, which eliminated him from place among the high men.

While the lake forms a perfect background and the contestant gets the sun over his shoulder, Mr. Phillips, who does most of his shooting on the Michigan lake front as a member of the South Shore Country Club, believes a blunder has been made in having the men "shoot down the line, which is to say, having the gunner shoot his twenty targets and then move to the next trap.

"There is an element of unfairness to it," he remarked, "in that where you might have clear skies and no breeze in the morning, a man shooting later may run into a storm and a traitorous wind that puts him all askew. By running the field in sections, no one can have an advantage."

One thousand dollars went to Mr. Phillips when he took the world's highest shooting prize for amateurs and he wears a diamond studded watch that went with it. He distanced 366 competitors to get the trophy, breaking 96 of 100. The amateur winner of the Rochester shoot qualifies for the Handicap this year, which is to be raced for at Dayton, O., in September.

John Philip Sousa also found a tricky wind and fell behind.

"I ought to have brought a gatling gun," he laughed, as he sat on the hotel veranda.

Candidate for Ananias Club.

The piazza was the place for anecdotal gossip of queer happenings with

the gun. The bronzed Fred Bills, who after the Rochester shoot will go first to Milwaukee for the Wisconsin state shoot and then to Minneapolis for the Minnesota tournament, early wrote a chapter, that takes rank with the winning fables.

With Jim Marshall and Bandmaster Sousa Bills were hunting for canvasbacks along the shore line of Lake Michigan last season, and the three could muster but one cartridge. It was tucked under the hammer of Bills's gun.

"It would be just our luck to have a couple of birds come along to gether," said Sousa, with a lugubrious look at an unfilled game bag.

Sure enough, the ducks came along together. But this didn't ruffle Mr. Bills. It wouldn't fluster anyone with an imagination. Let him tell it:

"I took aim and fired in between them, for they weren't more than two feet apart. Well, I potted both of them on the wings and do you know, they just flopped those wounded wings in such a way that one wing fell over the other. The birds worked their good wings and managed to fly into the bush, where we couldn't find them."

And Then Jake Came.

Early in the day came Jake. A coatee hung at his chin and at his arm pit was an air-rifle. His feet were encased in the heaviest of brogans, but he was facile in making known his wants.

"Be you Mr. Sousa?" the stranger asked W. H. Hammond.

"No, but I be his manager," retorted Hammond.

"Well, by jigger, I can shoot a bit and I challenge him," drawled the visitor.

It would be good press-agenting, thought Hammond, and he scurried around in search of the bandleader, but when Sousa had become an accomplice, Jake had shuffled into obscurity. It was the first time that any professional shooter has seen Jake in person. He is a mythical person who shoulders the blame, like the jinx, for all the pitfalls and blunders of the nimrods.

Women Attract Notice.

There was a sureness to Mrs. Harry Harrison's shooting yesterday that elicited admiration from the gallery. She tied her expert spouse for the eight events, eliding 133 birds of 160, and bettered Mr. Harrison's score in three events, equaling his in three and falling behind in the remaining two.

She didn't lack for a companion yesterday. Early on the grounds was Mrs. George H. Martin, of New York, a capable markswoman, who is here with her husband. Dr. Martin is affiliated with the New York Athletic Club, White Plains Club and Bergen Beach

Club and he and his wife have appeared on metropolitan ranges for years.

Another performer yesterday was Rush Razee, of transcontinental fame, who is among the leading fancy shooters. He throws all his own targets, making it impossible for him to completely regain his poise before firing. Among his exploits are destroying flying targets. With double barrels he wallops one target with the gun upside down, rights the weapon and shoots the second bird. With a revolver he splits playing cards held edgewise, using a mirror to sight with.

While the majority of gunners are steadied to shoot when the blue rocks are released, with a pump gun Mr. Razee will throw a blue rock in the air, remove a shell from his pocket, place it in the magazine, work the action loading the gun and break the target before it comes to earth. He would be a nice actor to meet on a dark night.

Midas-like, the manufacturers of ammunition, who have representatives on the grounds in droves, can now begin to rub their hands. The range was littered with thousands of empty shells when light fell. Most of the professionals have connections with some supply house.

Professionals Show Accuracy.

Their work yesterday was an improvement, and was to be expected, over that of the amateurs, although in some cases the amateur scores can well stand comparison. For the 150 targets the leaders

Merchandise Event To-day.

Eight events of fifteen targets each are on to-day's card, also a handicap merchandise event of fifty targets. In order to be eligible for the last-named contest, shooters must enter the entire program for to-day. Their records for the 120 targets, together with their previous record, will be used by the Handicap Committee in rating them.

The regular events for the three days are operating under the Squier money-back system, which designates a special fund for the purpose of paying back a portion of the losses of those amateurs who fail to win the amount of their entrance fees, less the price of the targets and \$1 extra.

The special fund is made up of added money, from a cent for each target trapped and from the total amount derived from the extra entrance fee of \$1 a day charged each contestant. The special events in doubles, the Rochester Walkback Handicap, the merchandise event and the Dean Richmond Trophy shoot are not included under the system.

One hundred dollars in gold and a gun valued at that amount are among the prizes offered to-day.

Bates was probably the youngest competitor in the tournament and his remarkable work was a revelation to the seasoned "vets." Donovan made it possible for the Rochesterians to shoot off for the cup by breaking every one of his birds in the original 25.

Riverside Club Fifth.

LEWISTON GUNNER WINNER OF MERCHANDISE EVENT IN STATE SHOOT WITH A PERFECT SCORE

**J. S. Hopkins Smashes Fifty Blue Rocks, Not
Needing Generous Handicap Alloted Him.
Homer Clark Misses Three in 380 Shots.**

BROWN SHOWS WAY TO AMATEURS. WRIGHT AND SKUTT TIE FOR SECOND

The weather was ideal yesterday for the third day's shooting of the New York State Sportsmen's Association fifty-sixth annual shoot, at Ontario Beach Park. The sun and the sky and the rest of the equipment not furnished by the association would have fitted in any modern novel's final happy scene—for everyone but the men with the guns. They said the wind was "a little tricky," or worse, according to their temperament. And Rush Razez, who gave an exhibition of how to shoot marbles with a gun up side down, claimed that he had never missed so many marble targets in an afternoon in the last ten years. Those who watched him know that about five of his shots, out of an indefinite number, went astray. It was remarked that fame sometimes breeds discontent; there were men there who would have given their right arm to shoot a fifth as well with their left.

Besides the regular events which will be averaged up with the shooting of the tournament's other days, to determine the high man, the Merchandise Handicap was the headliner yesterday. Practically all shooters who had entered in the day's regular events took their places facing the whitecapped lake and waited for the birds to sail out from the little green traphouses forward on the beach. Each man took a shot at fifty "birds" and in all there were sixty-nine prizes offered.

I. S. Hopkins, of Lewiston, turned in a perfect score for first prize. E. Goodwin, M. E. Barker and O. L. Franz finished next in order and F. S. Wright, New York state champion, was fifth.

Crowd in Happy Vein.

The handicap was run off quickly. In squads of six the sportsmen stood in half circles about 15 yards from the squat green boxes. Tensely in turn each man would set his feet in the sand, some of them nervously, others with calm sureness. Behind them waited a line of men and women, each interested in some one's shot. There were ripples of anticipation and comment. It was a holiday crowd, full of bright colors and dingy, greasy clothes of the gunners.

The man to shoot would hunch his shoulders and leaning forward, would cry, "Pull." The boy at the lever tugged at the iron bar and then from out the green cote a bird would spin at an uncertain angle over the water. There was a report, the bird changed to a puff of dust in the air and another score had been made.

'Sim' Glover in Good Form.

Homer Clark, of Alton, Illinois, furnished the sensation of yesterday when he missed two out of 120 targets in the regular program. On Tuesday he reached 159 out of a possible 160 targets, making a record of three misses out of 380 shots. It was some shooting and puts Clark in the lead over the other professionals at the meet. Lester German, who once shot baseballs over the plate for the New York Giants, played him a close second with seven misses over the same course. And "Sim" Glover, who has attended the shoots since the days when they used slingshots, demonstrated that he is still a master of the game, missing but eight shots in the two days.

In the main event several amateurs also came through well. Shooting at 120 birds G. N. Fish was high with 177, George A. Brown, second with 115, and W. W. Vanderhoof tied with A. J. Pendergast and Dr. G. H. Martin for third with records of 114. For the two days' shooting Fish leads the amateurs with 268 birds, of 280, and F. S. Wright and A. O. Skutt are simultaneously occupying second place with 267.

The shoot closes to-day when the last block of fifty targets a man, to determine the New York state champion, will be decided. There will also be eight events on

the regular program. The special events that have been in progress through the meet will also be concluded.

BUFFALO GUNNER HAILED AS CHAMPION SHOT OF STATE

Ninety-eight of 100 Targets Fall into Lake by F. S. Wright's Aim—Rochester Defeats New York A. C. in Team Event.

BUSHWHACKER CAUSES BAD MIX-UP

The silver Hurlbut W. Smith Cup, symbolic of the amateur trap-shooting championship of New York state, was permanently won by F. S. Wright, of the Audubon Gun Club of Buffalo, yesterday afternoon in the final flight of the sportsmen's association's most important event. His breakage was 98 blue rocks of a possible 100.

Rochester gunners saved their best ounces of ammunition for the stretch drive and took the club event from a field of five. The stout attack of the New York Athletic Club forced Rochester to the utmost, the trios finishing the scheduled number of targets with score even, 71 all. The shoot-off and with it the Dean Richmond trophy went to the home gunners, 69 to 67.

Bushwhacker Makes Trouble.

But one untoward action marred the last day. In the Ithaca event, arranged for shooters in doubles, a bit of hard feeling was engendered by a bystander's thoughtlessness. G. N. Fish, of Lyndonville, and Asher Skutt, of Morton, got on the score sheets in a tie at 46 each.

While one of the pair was shooting, a Rochester gunner was standing hard by the woden cave where the blue rocks were cached. As Fish shouted "Pull," he flung up his gun and fired twice. One of the blue rocks stopped short in its flight and fell toward the water. The other target spun on.

"Dead and lost!" dropped to announcer. There was a third bark of a gun and the second blue rock went to pieces. It was broken by a bushwhacker who was taking pot shots at missed birds.

"Dead and dead," the scorer reversed his reading, signifying that the shooter had killed both. The other blue rock was brought down, however, by a non-contestant. The Tournament Committee has now to decide to whom the gun offered for the event belongs.

Gun for New Yorker.

The hammerless weapon donated for the Rochester Walkback Handicap became the property of D. T. Leahy, of New York, after he disposed of D. Wadsworth in their tie. It was a fifteen-target event and in the first race each smashed all the "birds" loosed. In the shoot-off the score was 13 to 12 in the metropolitan gun's favor.

Six tied for third with fourteen hits each; and in the shoot-off Harry Harrison, of this city, was best. The cup presented by Dr. J. H. Weller for the highest amateur not winning a prize in the double event also went to Mr. Harrison.

The Hurlbut W. Smith Cup, which went to Mr. Wright, was his as a result of the deed of gift drawn up by the donor of the trophy in 1909. He stipulated that the sixth-year those winning the goblet would shoot the final. As Wright had won the cup in 1909, 1910, 1911 and 1912, he had only to meet J. D. Green, of Avon, who was successful last season, whom he defeated. Mr. Wright broke 422 of his 440 birds in all events.

At Highland, S. M. Crothers proved the best shot of the day, missing but three of his half-hundred clays. Crothers' nearest rival for high honors was J. M. Freed, a team-mate, who missed a half-dozen. Fisher led the attack for the visitors with 42. The clubs were almost as evenly matched in numbers as they were in ability, the home team having just one more man in attendance.

Bill Green, special officer connected with the Reading Coal and Iron Company police, returned from a five-day hunting expedition in the neighborhood of Catawissa, in Columbia county, with 14 pheasants, 28 rabbits, 11 quail and one squirrel. He reports that never were birds so scarce as this year in Catawissa district, which is noted widely for its

pheasants. Bill used a dog, and the birds he shot represented almost all the rises. The squirrel perished in an attempt to bite Bill.

In the dispute at the Clearview-Highland match the referee ruled "lost" on the last target S. Crothers fired at, and another member of the squad declared the target had been broken. The referee refused to change his decision, claiming that according to the rule of the league, the decision of the referee shall not be changed unless two men in the squad other than the shooter against whom the decision has been made, shall declare the target lost or broken. Only one member of the team made the declaration before the squad had left the stand. Had one other member declared the bird dead, Highland would have won the match.

Captain Caesar, of Princeton, won the silver cup offered by the Intercollegiate Trapshooting Association for high individual score, with 90 calls of "dead" out of his century of the clay flyers. Ryan, of Cornell, gave him a good race, finishing one target behind. Considering the bad weather conditions the scores were all fine. The Yale team, which won the match, scored 429 out of the 500 targets which comprised the program. Princeton was second, with 413; Cornell third, with 362, and Dartmouth last, with 351.

Thanksgiving Day saw a large number out at the various club shooting for the turkeys, which seem to always be on hand for this holiday. Two days later saw the third contest in the Philadelphia Trapshooters' League race. This race brought out more contestants than ever before and the interest and enthusiasm exceeded any previous contest in this, the largest league of clubs in the world. In addition to the ten clubs that contested in the League several other clubs held interesting and enjoyable shoots. It was a mild December day with quite a brisk wind that kept the targets jumping, so that shooting conditions were far from perfect, but nevertheless several fine scores were made at all the clubs.

THANKSGIVING DAY DOINGS.

SHOOTING ACADEMY.

One of the most interesting and closely contested shoots ever held over the traps of the Academy, at Wyoming avenue and D street was the annual turkey shoot of the club. Three turkeys and four chickens comprised the bill of fare for the marksmen to compete for. The high scores and close competition showed that the members were all anxious to carry home some one of the feathered tribe to help grace their Thanksgiving board.

H. W. Lodge, with 95 out of his century of the flyers scored dead, carried home the first prize bird. A. B. Thompson took second prize turkey by smashing 47. Al Gerner made sure of his last 50 clay birds by pulverizing every one of his last 50 clay birds. The four chickens were awarded to C. B. White, Dr. J. W. Frank, J. H. Harper and Joseph Taylor.

The longest run was made by Harper, with 70 straight breaks. Al Gerner was runner-up, with over 50, while the best H. W. Lodge could do was 48. Miss L. C. Gough was the only lady to shoot, and in a special 20-gauge race tied her brother with nine calls of dead out of 25 fired.

Harry Breist and Secretary Gough shot a special match for a box of cigars, Breist winning, 18 to 17.

The better evidence of the inclination toward self-participation in the realm of sport is to be had than in the marvellous growth which has attended trapshooting during the course of the last ten years. A decade ago this pastime claimed comparatively few, but now it has risen to a point where it rivals golf and tennis, and the call of the traps is sounding its appeal in every State, in every country, with increasing persistence. Predictions of its ultimate attainment, though optimistic, will probably, as years go by, prove to be far short of the mark. The growth has not been sporadic; it has been a steady increase by geometrical progression rather than arithmetical, for trapshooters are so enthusiastic that they are enlisting friends, and the friends enlisting others, and before long trapshooting will come into its own as the "sport alluring," a name which only recently has been applied to it.

What is the underlying reason for this rapid rise to popularity? First of all it must be remembered that there is something compelling in the appeal of a gun and that most people, even those not versed in the art of shooting, discover the charm of the trigger pull with their first effort. Success they cannot attain without study and practice, but it is the tantalizing lure of the perfect shot that holds them enthralled and makes them try again and again. The theory of perfection is so simple, more so, perhaps, than in any other line, that the shooter is disinclined to think himself baffled, and comes repeatedly to try his skill at the flying clay rocks.

675,000 Persons Face Traps.

Statistics in relation to any sport are interesting, sometimes conclusive, and in trapshooting they reveal a wonderful growth. Just consider that, ten years ago there were not more than 100,000 persons on the entire American continent who shot over the traps. Five years ago the number was not greater than 250,000, but, according to officials of the Interstate Association, in the last five-year period the number has swelled to the enormous total of 600,000 in this country alone, and there are about 75,000 who follow the sport in Canada.

The money expended by these men and women mounts well into the millions. In all about 36,000,000 clay rocks are "killed" each year, but, of course, this does not represent the number of shots fired by any means. The clay birds not destroyed are gathered in and used again, so that the real number of rounds fired is far in excess of the total of clay rocks destroyed. The cost of these targets is about \$270,000. Competent authorities, who have followed the trapshooting game for years estimate that each shooter fires about 500 rounds of ammunition in a year, so that the item for shells alone totals nearly \$12,000,000 a year. Traveling expenses and dues to gun clubs raise another big total. On the basis of \$60 per person, the enormous amount of \$40,500,000 is reached.

Another big figure is the cost of guns. The trap shooter is as particular about his gun as the golf devotee is of his clubs or the tennis player of his racquets, and the cost mounts much higher. The average price of a trap gun is about \$40, some being much lower and others far higher. One instance of the excessive expense may be mentioned as indicating the cost of some guns. B. M. Shanley of Newark, ex-amateur champion of the State of New Jersey, paid \$750 for a single-shot trap gun. It is not at all unusual to find some of the men paying \$350 for their guns. However, taking the average as only \$40, the amount invested in guns, allowing one to each of the shooters, and many have more, is \$27,000,000. Another sum to be reckoned is the cost of installing gun clubs. Some are established as cheap as \$150, while others rise to \$1,500 and above. Taking the average at \$1,000, with the total clubs numbering about 5,000, the money invested is about \$5,000,000. These figures show in clearest fashion just how much interest there is in the sport of trapshooting. On the other hand they are not indicative that the sport is expensive. What shall be the cost, rests with the individual. If he gives free rein to his inclinations, the cost will be high, but it remains true that he can enjoy a lot of shooting at the targets at moderate expense.

Figures Show Growth of Sport.

The growth of the sport can be shown by other statistics. In 1913, for instance, the number of contestants in registered tournaments was 7,014, a year later it was 7,849, and in 1915, 8,140. During the year just closing 10,528 persons competed. The number of tournaments for these respective years were 288, 314, 333, and 346. The targets trapped did not show rapid increase during 1913, 1914, and 1915, the respective figures being 4,528,570, 4,780,690, and 4,814,280. In 1916, however, the total mounted to 6,366,110.

Aside from the intuitive liking for shooting, which is the foundation on which the growth of the sport has been established, the causes which have led up to the popularity of trapshooting are found in the restrictions which have been put upon hunting. Years ago there was hunting to be had on every hand, but now the States have passed laws limiting the season and also limiting the bag, and the tendency is toward even greater restrictions. With game depleted the shooters found themselves face to face with the proposition of leaving their guns idle for ten or eleven months of the year.

It was this which brought trapshooting into popular favor. Gun clubs sprang up and the enthusiastic shooters turned their attention to the lure of the clay rocks, and in many instances found trapshooting more than a substitute for field sport. It was some time before the new régime was fairly established, but once in vogue it has risen rapidly. Many took it up who never shot a gun at wild fowl, and it was considered a good thing for trap shooting that the live-bird competitions had been eliminated. The Grand American during the past Summer at St. Louis called forth an entry of 619 persons from all parts of the United States and from Canada.

Young and Old Enjoy the Sport.

Trapshooting is by no means limited to men; the women also took it up with avidity, and it is one of the few sports where age does not impose a heavy handicap. In the Grand American handicap the range of ages was from 14 to 76 years. The youngest was William B. Phillips, Jr., son of a former winner of the Grand American, and the oldest was Captain J. F. Breitenstein of Oskaloosa, Iowa. The youngster broke 90 per cent. of his targets during the week, and the venerable Captain 80 per cent.

Trapshooting leagues are increasing each year. There are twenty-seven scattered over the United States, in which about 25,000 shooters are represented. The Philadelphia Trapshooters League, for instance, includes ten clubs and boasts a membership of approximately 2,000. Pennsylvania is the foremost of the States in following this sport. There are more gun clubs in the land of William Penn than any other, and the leagues are naturally greater in number, seven being the State's total. Illinois has six leagues, New Jersey four, and the time is not far distant, according to those who have followed the sport for years, when there will be as many leagues in trapshooting as there are in baseball.

Not all of those interested in trap-

The love of the game among the men has spread not alone throughout the United States and Canada, but to the Canal Zone and the United States Navy. The Canal Zone tournament drew mainly from the men of the army. The introduction of trapshooting in the navy was due to Paymaster F. P. Williams. While located in Colorado a number of years ago he became a devotee of trapshooting and was known as one of the most expert clay bird shots in that section. When he was transferred to the hospital ship Solace he still held his allegiance to trapshooting. He interested many of his brother officers in the sport and helped to organize gun clubs on their ships, and now there are, in addition to the original club on the Solace, organizations on the Arkansas, New York, Florida, South Carolina, Texas, Wyoming, Oklahoma, Cheyenne, and Glacier. Application for a tournament date was made to the Interstate Association, the governing body in trapshooting, and in a sanctioned competition at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, Paymaster Williams became trapshooting champion of the navy.

Great Record of R. L. Spotts.

No trapshooting story is complete without mention of the remarkable growth of the sport in this section and of the sterling performances of Ralph L. Spotts of the New York Athletic Club. The national amateur championship, held annually by the New York A. C., was inaugurated eleven years ago, and since that time has in each instance gone to the credit of an Easterner. New York or Philadelphia shooters have won during nine of the years and Boston and Wilmington each has a victory to the credit of a representative.

Spotts has twice held the title, but his crowning effort was last May, when he made the best record established in eleven years of the competition. In the preliminary event this year Spotts broke 193 targets and his record of 196 out of 200 is the best mark which has ever been attained in the titular event. There were 135 contestants, among them the best shooters in the country, and one woman shooter had the hardihood to try for the amateur championship, Mrs. A. G. Wilkes of San Francisco.

For one who seeks to secure honors at the traps, the opportunities are many. Club shoots form a big item in the list of competitions, but of course they are not under the sanction of the Interstate Association. The events of the latter are the banner ones of the year. In every State there are championship shoots and beyond these are the sectional championships. Above all, however, stands the Grand American Handicap, with its purses aggregating \$15,000. In the tournament last August 227,250 targets were thrown.

A great deal of trapshooting is of course never included in the gun club records. The development of the hand trap has provided opportunities for two or three men to enjoy a day's sport without going to a gun club. The growing demand for these traps indicates that this is a phase of the sport which will expand largely in the next two or three years.
