In Wagner's version of the story of "Tristan and Isolde" an incident occurs on board the vessel in which Isolde is being accompanied by Tristan to Cornwall to be the bride of King Mark. Isolde, hating the idea of the Cornish marriage, resolves to kill both Tristan and herself by poison, to be prepared by her maid, Brangane, who, however, substitutes a love potion for the death draught. This is the dramatic climax to the first act of the opera, and the music of the Prelude is almost entirely evolved therefrom. The love potion, we are told, "becomes in Wagner the symbol of irresistible love," and its musical equivalent forms the leading motive of the Prelude, which is given out at the very beginning of the movement by the wood-wind, and then several times repeated, so as to impress it on the

Cleveland Symphony to Give Wagner Program

The Cleveland Orchestra, Nikolai Sokoloff, conductor, has many traditions. One which has long been cherished by patrons is the annual Wagnerian concert. The event this season is scheduled for the Thanksgiving pair of symphony concerts in Masonic Hall, next Thursday evening and Friday afternoon. So great a success did she score on her first appearance that Manager Gatti-Casazza forthwith brought 'round a five-year contract with the Metropolitan Opera Co. for her to sign.

This is her first concert tour, and because of her duties with the Metropolitan, it is very limited. Cleveland is fortunate in being able to hear her.

Mme. Kappel was born in Halle, Germany, and began her musical career as a church singer, going later for study in the Conservatory of Leipsig. At 18, she made her debut as Leonora in "Fidelo," in the Royal Theatre of Hanover. For seven years, she remained the idol of Hanover, despite tempting offers made her by Vienna. Finally persuaded, she signed with the State Opera of Vienna, and immediately Munich began suing for favor. Vienna refused to part with her, but finally compromised, releasing her for Festival engagements only. For several seasons, Mme. Kappel has divided her time between the Vienna and Munich Opera companies, and now America is to have a share of the great singer's gift for the next five years.

The composer Strauss has taken a personal interest in the diva, and has

himself coached her in a number of his operas. Among her most notable Wagnerian roles are: Isolde, Sieglinde, Kundry, Brunnhilde, Fricka, Elizabeth and Ortrud. New York critics who heard her Isolde gave her unstinted praise. "One must go back to the 'Isolde' of Fremstadt to recall any comparable to that of Mme. Kappel," wrote

one critic. Sokoloff is recognized as a master interpreter of the Wagnerian music dramas. The Thanksgiving concert promises one of rare delight to the hosts of devotees of the great master of Bayreuth.



The Colonial, which only stands on its own feet by the assistance of the two tall buildings on either side of it holding it up, was presenting a "road company" in a melodrama, "Her Unborn Child;" the Alhambra presented a stock company of "The Haunted House;" the Ohio had a stock company in "They Knew What They Wanted," at first advertised for the Alhambra Theatre at \$1.00 and on account of being moved to the Ohio Theatre, where they specialize in "half-rate tickets" it was advanced to the aristocratic scale of \$2.50, although it is the same attraction.

The Hanna Theatre was presenting Sigmund Romberg's most beautiful operetta, "The Desert Song."

Wandering to the Hanna Theatre, we expected to find young Whittendale tearing his hair out and with blood in his eyes. Instead, we found that gentleman, with his George M. Cohan-ish smile, standing in the back of an increased box office staff, listening to the following conversations:

"Sorry, madam, all seats sold out for

"No, madam, no seats left in the balcony for the rest of the week."

Reading With a Purpose

THIS WEEK IN CLEVELAND

To say that Donald was an unruly child is to put the matter mildly. During his first days in an Iowa City preschool group, he almost caused a panic. He banged the building blocks around, struck at the other children if they had something he wanted, ran away from any teacher who started to make a request of him, and then laughed or shouted at her in defiance.

Donald had an awakening. At home he had had few playthings or interests to challenge and steady his efforts, and no companions of his own age. At the preschool he discovered that it was as much fun to use his energies in pounding a nail as in pounding another child or the piano; in fact pounding the nail had the added advantage of being a step in "making something." He found that climbing the ladders and pulling others in the express wagon were more interesting activities than running from the teachers, especially after realizing that they turned their backs on him every time he ran away.

Dr. Bird T. Baldwin, for ten years director of the Iowa Child Welfare Research Station where young children are studied and helped by means of the preschools, gave many a child like Donald his first lesson in getting along with a new and apparently contrary world, and many a teacher and parent a conception of the mysterious workings of a child's body and mind.

Just before his untimely death, Dr. Baldwin prepared a reading course on The Young Child for parents and teachers, which has recently been published by the American Library Association. In it he deals with the everyday problems confronting most parents of young children, such as physical and mental needs, play, habit, emotions, etc.; and he suggests for further reading a few practical books which will help to prepare the child for an active, useful and happy life.

The Young Child is one of the Reading with a Purpose series, which now consists of 39 reading courses on a variety of subjects. These and the books recommended in each will be found at the Cleveland Public Library, according to the statement of Miss Eastman, the

The cast consists of Katherine Wick Kelly, who plays the name part, Noel Leslie, Rolf Engelhardt, Ellen Lowe, Crawford K. Wright, Elmer Lehr, Margaret Hamilton, and Thomas R. Ireland.

"Outside Looking In" or, as it might be called, "life in a box-car," opening in the Charles S. Brooks Theatre Friday, is an adaptation of Jim Tully's "Beggars of Life." It is a colorful sketch of the itinerant life of the "wobblies," the principal scene of the play taking place in a freight car traveling over the rails in mountains.

Maxwell Anderson was co-author with Lawrence Stallings of "What Price Glory." He has since written "Lightening of the Gods," a play about the Sacco-Vanzetti affair, now running in New York. "Outside Looking In" was originally produced at the Greenwich Village Theatre but did not tour the country. The performance at The Playhouse is its first presentation in Cleveland. In the cast are Carl Benton Reid, Russell Collins, Paul Foley, William Young, Marvin Kline, and Ewart Whiteworth.

The religious oratorio "The Messiah" will be presented in the main hall of Cleveland's Public Auditorium the afternoon of Sunday, Dec. 6, by the Cleveland Welsh Male Chorus under the direction of William Hughes.

Director Hughes expects to have 350 voices in the chorus in addition to vocal soloists. For the past two years "The Messiah" has been presented at Masonic Temple by this chorus. But each year hundreds had to be turned away and this year the Public Hall was chosen to accommodate the crowd. It is expected that 10,000 will hear the oratorio as admission will be free.

THE CLEVELAND MUSEUM OF ART

By DAISY W. WARNER

Much stress has been laid on the importance of the tapestries, paintings, enamels, and ivories in the exhibition of Representative Art through the Ages at the Museum of Art. But while absorbed in these more striking objects, don't overlook those of less magnitude,

for there is nothing in the show that is not full of distinction and significance.

Take the superb rock crystal cross, for instance, which dominates the large glass case as one enters Gallery IX. In the dim past this belonged to the Emperor Rudolph, first of the Hapsburg to rule over the Holy Roman Empire, and in 1927 was added to the Wade Collection of the Museum.


Rock crystal has always been considered the most precious of all materials. It is said that once when Nero was in a fit of rage, he dashed a rock crystal cup to the floor, because rock crystal was the only thing commensurate with his anger.

The Madonna and Child, also reproduced above, was formerly in the famous Spitzer Collection, and dates from

the thirteenth century. The figure is well composed, the features good, and draperies handled beautifully. This has been lent for this exhibition by Demotte of New York.


Several Persian and Indo-Persian miniatures are shown, two of which were originally in an album in the library of Shah Jehan, builder of the famous Taj Mahal. They were later in the collection of the Shahs of Persia, having been carried away as loot during the Persian invasion of India in 1738. This album was later divided and sold in the Paris markets, in 1909, by a brother of Shah Nasr-ud-Din, who, for political reasons, had fled to Russia. Three pages of medieval illuminated manuscript, recently acquired for the Museum collection, are also shown.

A plate of painted enamel of the sixteenth century depicts Joseph making himself known to his brothers. The maker of this beautiful piece is known only by his signature "Master I. C." This was also formerly in the Spitzer Collection.

Vernon Ladies' Association of the Union, to be applied towards the maintenance of Mount Vernon. the home of George Washington, and one of the foremost shrines of American patriotism.

SOUSA'S BAND

Lieutenant Commander John Philip Sousa has brought his internationally famous band of 75 pieces direct from New York to Minneapolis especially for this occasion. The noted march king will celebrate his 75th birthday this year, as well as the fiftieth anniversary of his band. Thus his coming for the Dedication of the Foshay Tower takes on special significance. All of the Sousa public concerts will be played from the special stand on the roof of the two-story building at Second Avenue South and Ninth Street.
