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

## QUESTIONS FOR CLASS DISCUSSION & WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS

- Where is your family from? What is the traditional music of your ancestors? Is it similar to anything you heard today? How is it different from what you heard?
- What music makes you curious? What music excites you?
- What was your favorite piece of music from the video? Why did you like it? How would you describe your favorite piece from the video to a friend? Where was it from? Listen to some other music from that same region. Does it sound similar or different from what you heard on the video?
- Do you know the other verses to "Shenandoah"? Do you know any other folk songs from America?
- What is improvisation? What styles of music utilize improvisation, and how? Did you hear any other improvisation in the music from the video?

- Some of the music in the video is for dancing. What are some other dance styles, and what music goes along with them? From where do those dances and music originate?
- Define folk music in your own words. Why is folk music important to your culture and the culture of your family?
- Did you recognize any of the music you heard on the video? Where have you heard it before?
- What instruments in the video were new to you? Which ones had you never seen before? Did you have a favorite?
- Describe the way the penny whistle and Irish flute sound different. Why do you think they sound different?
- What is a clave, and how can you make one at home?
- Some of the music is from different regions but used the same instruments. How did the musicians use the instruments to make the music sound different?
- What made the musical styles in the video different? Was it the rhythms? The scale? The instruments? Something else?

#### **EXTENSION ACTIVITIES**

- Make a family tree for your family, noting where each person was born. Then learn a song from one of those
  places and share it with your class.
- Create a clave with items you find around your house or yard. Carefully holding your homemade instruments, play the "son clave" rhythm along with the musicians on "Guantanamera."
- Clap along with the musicians on "Rampi Rampi." Is it a steady rhythm, or does it change?
- Look up the English translations for one of these songs and follow along with the words while you listen to the music. What is the music about?
  - » "Furusato"
  - » "Arirang"
  - » "Funiculì, Funiculà"
  - » "Guantanamera"
- Learn the basic steps to a hornpipe, jig, and reel. Dance along with the Marines in the Irish section of the video.
- Learn the words to and sing along with one of these songs: (See lyrics on last page)
  - » "Shenandoah"
  - » "Arirang"
  - » "Furusato"
  - » "Funiculì, Funiculà"
  - » "Guantanamera"
  - » "We'll Meet Again"
- For each piece of music in the video, locate the country or region using a world map. If it's a specific country, draw and color a sketch of the country's flag.
- For each country or region represented in the video, find at least one example of architecture, visual art, and cuisine that is unique to that place. For each example, what do you find most interesting?
