SOUSA SEASON OPENER: "THE MARCH KING" and the MARINE BAND, 1880-1892

John Philip Sousa first served in the Marine Band as an apprentice musician from ages 13-20. Following his enlistment, he worked as a conductor and composer in Philadelphia until 1880, when at the age of only 25 he was called back by the Commandant of the Marine Corps to serve as the United States Marine Band's



17th Director. During the next 12 years, Sousa embarked on a musical odyssey that simultaneously transformed "The President's Own" from a local military band into a world-renowned musical organization and transformed himself into a national celebrity and "The March King." This concert traces Sousa's career as Marine Band Director and highlights some of the music and events that shaped his famous tenure. Much of the music featured on this program came from Sousa's pen during his years as Director, and all was performed with the band during his time on the podium of "The President's Own."

Although he left his native Norway to study in the traditions of Felix Mendelssohn and Robert Schumann, Edvard Grieg eventually returned to his homeland to find his own nationalistic voice, becoming the first Norwegian composer to achieve major international recognition. He attained that fame at the young age of 25 with his Piano Concerto in A minor, one of the most prominent in the piano repertoire, and the work celebrates its 150th anniversary in 2018. Bookending the program are works by those very composers of the German tradition that markedly influenced his compositional style.



A Symphonic Epic

This program features two very different but equally epic

symphonies, including one of Gustav Mahler's most iconic contributions to the genre. His complete Symphony No. 3 is more than an hour and a half in length and uses a massive orchestra, chorus, and soloists. However, the 35-minute first movement is a miniature symphony in and of itself and will be performed in transcription on this concert along with the transformative



Finale of the entire work. The first half of the program features composer Johan de Meij's dramatic and colorful Symphony No. 1 inspired by the legendary J. R. R. Tolkien's books *The Lord of the Rings*. The year 2018 marks the 30th anniversary of this substantial original symphony for band, and the Marine Band was among the first to perform it three decades ago. The composer himself will be on hand to lead this commemorative performance of his Symphony No. 1.

Violinist William H. Santelmann was Director of the Marine Band, serving from 1898-1927. Under his leadership a symphony orchestra was formed within "The President's Own" and was composed of band musicians who doubled on string instruments. During this program, the Marine Chamber Orchestra will take the audience back to 1918,



a time when the world was at war. The program will include Staff Sgt. Charlaine Prescott's performance of Camille Saint-Saëns' Cello Concerto No. 1 and Marine Band Director Taylor Branson's march "The Marines of Belleau Wood," in honor of the centennial of the battle that established the Marine Corps as an indispensable fighting force.



"With the stirring strains of the Marines' Hymn, the National **Broadcasting Company brings** you the music of the United States Marine Band!" Thus began every script of one of the longest running programs in radio history, NBC's "The Dream Hour," which began in 1922 and continued through



the 1940s. The original program was created for shut-ins, and musical selections were largely determined by patrons sending in requests. The result was a delightful mix of classic marches, thrilling overtures, virtuoso solos, and novelty numbers. In celebration of the 220th anniversary year of "The President's Own," the band once again presents one of its popular live re-enactments of these famous broadcasts from the Golden Age of radio. Radio and television broadcaster, actor, and creator and host of NPR's "Millennium Music," Robert Aubry Davis will serve as guest moderator for this year's mix of music and memories from yesteryear.



LEONARD BERNSTEIN CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

The year 2018 marks the 100th year of the birth of the great American conductor, composer, and educator Leonard Bernstein. From his featured conducting debut with the New York Philharmonic in 1943 that catapulted him into the spotlight, to his emotional, final performance with the Boston Symphony Orchestra at the Tanglewood Music Center just a few months before his death in 1990, Bernstein left a mark on the orchestral world that has not been surpassed by any other American conductor. Equally known as a composer, Bernstein brilliantly fused musical worlds together and helped define



American musical heritage in the 20th century, breaking molds and bringing classical music to new audiences. This concert highlights several fascinating moments in Bernstein's phenomenal career as both a composer and conductor. Featuring some of his music that is perhaps less ubiquitous than his most famous works, this tribute highlights the creativity, originality, and larger-than-life musical personality of a true American musical icon.



"THE PRESIDENT'S OWN" UNITED STATES MARINE BAND

stablished by an Act of Congress in 1798, the United States Marine Band is America's oldest continuously active professional musical organization. Its mission is unique—to provide music for the President of the United States and the Commandant of the Marine Corps.

President John Adams invited the Marine Band to make its White House debut on New Year's Day, 1801, in the then-unfinished Executive Mansion. In March of that year, the band performed for Thomas Jefferson's inauguration and is believed to have performed for every presidential inaugural since. An accomplished musician himself, Jefferson is credited with giving the Marine Band its title, "The President's Own."

Whether performing for State Dinners or South Lawn arrivals, events of national significance, or receptions, Marine Band musicians appear at the White House an average of 200 times each year. Every fall, the Marine Band performs throughout a portion of the continental United States during its National Concert Tour, a tradition initiated in 1891 by "The March King" John Philip Sousa, who was the band's legendary 17th Director from 1880-92.

While the Marine Band is firmly dedicated to preserving the musical traditions established over its long history, it

is equally committed to serving as a leading ensemble in the development of new repertoire for winds. In recent years, "The President's Own" has commissioned David Rakowski's Ten of a Kind (Symphony No. 2), "Scamp" by Pulitzer Prize-winning composer Melinda Wagner, Flourishes and Meditations on a Renaissance Theme by Michael Gandolfi, and Symphony No. 2, Voices, by James Stephenson. Additionally, the band has premièred dozens of other works by composers such as Scott Lindroth, Gerard Schwarz, Jacob Bancks, Laurence Bitensky, Narong Prangcharoen, and Donald Grantham. "The President's Own" also continues to attract prominent guest conductors to its podium including Osmo Vänskä, Leonard Slatkin, José Serebrier, Gerard Schwarz, Giancarlo Guerrero, and John Williams. During its bicentennial year in 1998, the Marine Band was the very first ensemble inducted into the Classical Music Hall of Fame in Cincinnati.

For more than two hundred years, the Marine Band has been an integral part of countless events that have helped shape the nation's identity and unique artistic culture. Now well into its third century of bringing music to the White House and to the American public, "The President's Own" continues to affirm that the arts are an invaluable bridge between people.

COLONEL JASON K. FETTIG

Colonel Jason K. Fettig is the 28th Director of "The President's Own" United States Marine Band. He joined in 1997 as a clarinetist and soon became a frequently featured soloist with both the band and the Marine Chamber Orchestra. After serving four years in the organization, he was selected as an Assistant Director, and he conducted his first concert with the Marine Band Aug. 1, 2001. He was commissioned a first lieutenant in July 2002, promoted to captain in August 2003, and became the band's Executive Officer the following year. He was promoted to major in August 2007 and to lieutenant colonel in July 2014, one week before assuming leadership of "The President's Own." He was promoted to his present rank in August 2017 in the Roosevelt Room by President Donald J. Trump. He is the third Director of "The President's Own" to be promoted to colonel in a White House ceremony. As Director, Col. Fettig is the music adviser to the White House and regularly conducts the Marine Band and Marine Chamber Orchestra at the Executive Mansion and at all Presidential Inaugurations. He also serves as music director of Washington, D.C.'s historic Gridiron Club, a position held by every Marine Band Director since John Philip Sousa.

MAJOR MICHELLE A. RAKERS

Assistant Director Major Michelle A. Rakers joined "The President's Own" United States Marine Band in May 1998 as a trumpeter/cornetist. She was appointed Assistant Director and commissioned a first lieutenant in July 2004 and promoted to captain by Commandant of the Marine Corps General Michael W. Hagee on Jan. 1, 2006. She was promoted to major and appointed Executive Officer and Senior Assistant Director in July 2014. She is both the first female Assistant Director and first female commissioned officer in the history of "The President's Own." With the Marine Band, Maj. Rakers has performed at the White House, in the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area, and across the country during the band's annual concert tour. The year 2018 marks her final concert season conducting "The President's Own."

CAPTAIN RYAN J. NOWLIN

Assistant Director Captain Ryan J. Nowlin joined "The President's Own" United States Marine Band in August 2010 as staff arranger. He was appointed Assistant Director and commissioned a first lieutenant in July 2014 and was promoted to his current rank in July 2016. With "The President's Own," Capt. Nowlin has arranged and composed a variety of music for the Marine Band, Marine Chamber Orchestra, brass ensemble, and various small ensembles. Capt. Nowlin's music has been heard in performance at many White House events, including state dinners and the Kennedy Center Honors and Medal of Freedom receptions. As Assistant Director, Capt. Nowlin's responsibilities include conducting the Marine Band and Chamber Orchestra in their winter/spring concert series and summer concerts on the National Mall as well as at ceremonies in the national capital region and at the White House.
