"The Apaches place a pole in the centre of a plaza, on the upper end of which is fastened a human scalp, decorated with colored ribbons, paper, etc. Around the base of the pole are squatted the squaws, who keep up the rhythm of the dance by rubbing with a corneol a sort of tom-tom, made of clay baked in the sun and covered with skin. The bucks join hands and begin dancing in a circle, chanting the words, 'Ma-Ma-Ma-Mine Ga-Ga' to the above melody. After dancing in this manner for a short time they go to another plaza, repeating the ceremony, changing again and again until they are out of sight."


